### Pilgrim Holiness Church Trustees Sell Property; Name of Group Changed

The Pilgrim Holiness Church ceased to exist locally this week as its church property and parsonage were purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Sam Hale and Mr. and Mrs. Jonas Miller, members of the church congregation, from district trustees with whom title to the property had been lodged. The church, it was announced at the same time will be the scene of a revival meeting which will be held, beginning Sunday night, under the name of the Prestonsburg Tabernacle. The Rev. P. Williams, of Inez, will be the evangelist, and special music will be rendered at each service.

The Rev. Irvine Patrick, who has been pastor of the church for several months, will have no further connection with the work here, he said. He declined to comment on the change other than to state the district trustees had a legal right to sell the property. Mr. Miller will be in active charge of the work at the Tabernacle, it was stated.

It was also announced this week that a Cannel Coal Gap building which, one night, a few years ago, was a scene of violence as four men lay dead or dying after a gun fray within its walls, had been leased by the Assembly of God and will be converted to church purposes. The Rev. Howard O. Barrick, as pastor, will begin a revival there Sunday night and will conduct regular Sunday School sessions and worship periods at 9:30 and 10:45 Sunday mornings.

## HOTEL BOUGHT FOR HOSPITAL

### Also Purchase Former Site of Funeral Home At Undisclosed Price

The Prestonsburg General hospital purchased Saturday from Mayor E. P. Arnold the Auxier hotel and the old Arnold Funeral Home building on First avenue for future conversion into hospital property. Amount involved in the transaction was not revealed.

The hospital, which is owned by Dr. John G. Archer and Dr. George P. Archer, will begin alterations and remodeling work on the hotel building as soon as the lease of O. P. Powers, who is operating the hotel, expires.

An elevator will be installed. First floor of the hotel will be converted into space for a clinic, and the second and third floors for hospital rooms and other facilities. The old funeral home structure will be razed, and land at the rear of both buildings and at the rear of the Odd Fellows' lot, extending to the river, will provide parking space as well as room for any building additions necessary in the future.

The property thus acquired will afford 40 hospital rooms, with 20 baths. The present hospital building at West Prestonsburg has 25 beds, and it is said the hotel building will be arranged so that this capacity can be almost doubled.

Definite plans for future use of the present hospital structure at West Prestonsburg have not been announced.

## Cattle-Stealing Term Upheld by High Court

One-year pen term imposed by a Floyd circuit court jury on Bev Shepherd, of West Prestonsburg, for cattle-stealing was affirmed this week by the Court of Appeals, but the court at the same time reversed sentences of three others charged as his accomplices.

### 60 Floyd Boys Among 500 Participants In Events; Expect 1,500 Visitors In Paintsville to Witness Annual Festivities of Future Farmers of America

At least 1,500 visitors are expected to witness almost 500 FFA participants from 23 Eastern Kentucky counties vie in 26 contests which will highlight activities of the annual field day of the Future Farmers of America, April 30, at Paintsville. ## OHIO VALLEY GROUP BACKS LOCKS, DAMS

### Resolution Follows Washington Meeting Urging Canalization

This week, after 35 Eastern Kentucky leaders in the fight for Big Sandy river canalization had returned home from Washington where they urged on members of Congress the importance of the project, advocates of the waterway reported from another section of the country, Tuesday night of this week, the Ohio Valley Improvement Association, in its 53rd annual convention at Pittsburgh, unanimously adopted this resolution:

"We, the valley-wide and local interests, urge upon the Congress of the United States its earnest consideration and immediate favorable action authorizing the canalization of the Big Sandy river and the Tug and Levisa forks in West Virginia and Kentucky."

Last Thursday evening, a delegation representing every county in this section and some in neighboring West Virginia was host to a dinner at the Mayflower hotel in Washington at which Congressional leaders were guests.

For two days they called on members of Congress, especially members of the House and Senate Public Works Committees—carefully explaining the Big Sandy canalization project, asking that it be considered solely on its merits.

Their case, they feel, can be reduced to a simple choice by the federal government:

Make the Big Sandy navigable so the huge resources of bituminous coal can be tapped and the region industrialized, or prepare to duplicate the 30's by pouring millions of dollars of direct relief into the area.

There's no question about the choice members of the Big Sandy Valley Association would make. They made it abundantly clear that they don't want a dole, that they don't want "resettlement" of their folks into other areas; that they don't want any special advantages over any other region; that they simply want a chance to be self-supporting by marketing their coal on an equal basis with the product of other fields.

J. B. Wells, Paintsville, one of the principal spokesmen at the Mayflower dinner last Thursday night, pointed out that the federal government spent \$100,000,000 in direct relief in the Big Sandy region between

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## JOHNSON GETS 10-YEAR TERM IN FRATRICIDE

### Daniels' Trial, April 25, In Dan Collins Slaying Jury Returns True Bills

First murder trial of the current circuit court session ended Tuesday afternoon in the conviction of George Johnson, former deputy constable, in the slaying on Abner Fork, several weeks ago, of his brother, Deputy Sheriff Matt Johnson. He was given a 10-year pen term.

It was said, next day, that Johnson may appeal the verdict. During the trial he was confident, often smiling, he claimed his brother fired on him first. To explain the fact that some of his bullets ranged slightly upward in the victim's body, he testified he fired from a crouch.

Mrs. Zella Mae Mullins, wife of Buster Mullins, in whose place of business the slaying took place, was the only Commonwealth witness and her testimony followed that she gave in a statement shortly after the shooting. She said she asked Matt Johnson to try to do something with his brother who was drunk and offensive. Matt then told some small boys to clear out, that he was going to close the place. Then, she testified, he told George he was going to arrest him. Thereupon George Johnson informed his brother he was "as much the law as you are."

George started to draw his gun, and Matt followed suit, George beating him to the draw and firing the first shot which apparently took effect. As Matt Johnson reeled and sank floorward, she said, he fired, the shot going wild. George Johnson then emptied contents of his revolver into his brother's body, she testified.

The defense, however, attacked through the evidence of several witnesses the slain officer's reputation for violence and also assailed his morals. Raymond Little also testified for the defendant, claiming Matt Johnson fired over his shoulder.

Two murder indictments were among the 41 true bills reported by the grand jury here as of Wednesday morning and both men named in the indictments—Graden Daniels and Mack Little—remain in jail without bond.

Daniels, who is accused of the hammer-murder of Dan Collins, veteran C. & O. Railway Company employe, was denied bond by Circuit Judge Edward P. Hill Wednesday morning. The prisoner had ap-

Also the P-T.A. tabled their drive till next year of sponsoring the purchasing of a piano for the school, on the grounds we were being criticised for asking for money for so many things, and especially at this time when employment has not been too good in our vicinity.

"As every person in Floyd county well knows, we have solicited funds for tournament advertisements, also purchased uniforms for our band through donations from friends in Betsy Layne, Prestonsburg, and Floyd county, as well as in neighboring counties, during the last few weeks. I believe we discussed that point with you and Mr. Frazier; however, we would have tried to have had the program, had we not been preparing for the Floyd County Music Festival, and the Music festival which is being held in Pikeville today.

"The P-T.A. has had two programs recently, realizing \$16 from one and near \$20 from the other. They agreed with me that we should cease to have our programs for the time being, and as I said, set aside the amount raised for the piano till next year. I told you when you were here we would not be registered as



If the good people of Floyd county want their county to be better, and to see those things done which they have long dreamed of, they have the opportunity now to join me in a fight for that very cause. I welcome the friendship and support of all, and promise every service of which I am capable.

**Highway Department Says Scholarship Applications To Be Received in April**

The State Highway Department announced last week applications for its student-employees' scholarships will be received through April. Highway Engineer D. H. Bray said 58 applications already have come in for the 18 scholarships which the department values at \$500 each. Graduates of accredited high schools are eligible.

Examinations will be held May 2 in the department's district offices at Bowling Green, Flemingsburg, Louisville, and Somerset; May 3 at its office at Elizabethtown, and May 4 at its offices in Lexington, Covington, Paducah and Pikeville.

A University of Kentucky committee will choose two young men from each district to be enrolled at the College of Engineering. They will be classed as highway department employees and will be associated with its laboratory work on the University campus.



## Tax Commissioner Tests, Dates and Places Named According to New Law

Examination sites and dates for candidates for county tax commissioner were announced Monday by the State Revenue Department.

Under a law passed last week by the special session of the Legislature, all examination certificates, except those held by present tax commissioners, have been revoked.

All candidates for the office except incumbents seeking re-election, are required to take written and oral examinations given by the Revenue Department. The tests will be given by two Democratic members of the Kentucky Tax Commission and Dr. W. J. Moore, Richmond Republican, and a former state tax commissioner.

Candidates in this section will take the examination at Pikeville, April 21.

Candidates who took the written examination under the old law on March 14 are not required to take another written examination. But they must now take the oral test on the date set for their Congressional district.

The department noted the new law provides minimum pay of \$2,400 a year for county tax commissioners. It encourages all persons interested in the job to take the examinations.

These newspaper headlines are so misleading. For upwards of two weeks now I have been reading of Butch, the headless rooster, who not only set up a squawk when a Los Angeles housewife began divesting him of his feathers but actually got up from the cooling board, so to speak, and toddled off.

And until a few days ago, as a result of these headlines, I had carried around with me a mental picture of the rooster ambling about with only his breadjerker sticking up above where his collar would have been, had he worn such a thing.

Now, however, I am enlightened. The rooster isn't headless at all. 

1930 and 1940. Estimated cost of the canalization project, he said, is \$82,300,000.

Wells pointed out, also that the people of the area depend almost entirely—either directly or indirectly—upon the mining and shipping of coal. Their mines, he said, are, and have been for many years, a marginal industry. Marginal, not because the coal is not abundant and of the best quality, but because it costs them \$2.73 to ship a ton of coal to Cincinnati by rail, whereas it costs the mines of the Kanawha river valley in West Virginia just 80 cents to ship a ton of coal to Cincinnati down the canalized Kanawha river and the Ohio.

Dr. O. W. Thompson, Pikeville, president of the Association, quoted government-survey statistics to the effect there is enough high-quality coal in the Big Sandy area to maintain high mine output for 100 years or more. And he added that if the coal could be brought out of the mines now so difficult of access, the region not only would prosper from the shipping of coal but also from the attracting of industries to Pikeville, Prestonsburg, Paintsville, Louisiana, Catlettsburg, Ashland and other towns and cities in the surrounding area.

The project was approved three years ago by the army engineers and the Secretary of War. And during the 79th Congress, authorization was included in the rivers-and-harbors bill brought to the House floor. There the project was deleted, the only item in the omnibus bill singled out for defeat. Association members say that was because of the opposition of the railroads and of some Congressmen from other states—including West Virginia—who felt they would be protecting their own areas by killing the project.

William H. Webb, executive vice-president of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, told the group that the Big Sandy program was "one of the best in the United States" and that it had a top priority on that organization's list of recommended projects.

Congressmen who spoke at the dinner and pledged support were Brent Spence, Tom Underwood, Noble Gregory, Joe Bates, Carl Perkins and Frank Chelf.

E. E. Hedrick, of West Virginia, attended the dinner but left before the Congressmen were called on to speak. M. G. Burnside, of West Virginia, did not say whether he was for or against the project, but he cautioned members of the Association that 79 cents of every tax dollar is going for payment for the last war and the current defense program, adding that he felt "there is very little chance your project will get through this Congress."

Dr. Thompson replied that the Association members felt they would be successful, because culmination of the project would aid in the nation's industrial defense plans.

**Ohio River Cities Stress Water Sanitation**

Cities on the upper reaches of the Ohio river and its tributaries are showing an unusual recognition of the importance of pollution control action. Henry Ward, Kentucky commissioner of conservation, reported following a meeting of the Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission at Pittsburgh.

The city of Pittsburgh and 128 other municipalities in Allegheny county, Pa., are cooperating in a joint program to build a sewage treatment plant, Ward said.

"The Pittsburgh area recognizes its obligation to cease dumping its raw sewage and industrial wastes onto the cities downstream," Ward said. "Kentucky cities need to advance their own programs to cooperate in the Ohio river pollution control plan."

Ward was elected vice-chairman of the commission, which is composed of representatives of eight states in the Ohio river basin, Joseph L. Quinn, Terre Haute, Indiana, was named chairman, succeeding Hudson Biery, of Cincinnati.

It is planned to house all local offices of the Department of Economic Security in the same building.

Funds so raised are spent for services such as: operations, braces, x-rays, etc., through the Kentucky Crippled Children Commission, official state agency, "special education" under direction from the State Department of Education; corrective treatment at the Curative Workshop, in Louisville, Society operated physical and occupational therapy center for children and adults; convalescent care which will soon be available in the new 48-bed Convalescent Home, now being completed near Lexington. This home is to be a haven where little crippled patients, after receiving surgical attention at the hospital, will be sent for special convalescent care, treatment, and schooling until they are able to go home. Removal of these patients to the home will release more hospital space, thereby speeding up Kentucky's aid to crippled children.

Michigan authorities, Monday morning, claimed Ernest Wallen whom Floyd county officers had arrested Friday at Allen on a warrant from Sheriff John L. Osborn's office in Ann Arbor, Mich., charging Wallen with violation of probation. 



**Floyd Pollution Fight Under Way**

**300,000 Pounds of Fish Wasting Yearly In State; Giggling Experiment Begun**

"300,000 pounds of fish meat goes to waste in Kentucky every year because edible rough fish can't be caught on hooks," State Game and Fish Director Earl Wallace said Friday in announcing that the state had relaxed the restrictions on fish giggling.

This relaxation, however, is only on an experimental basis to be carried on only in Bourbon county.

If tests show that most of the fish caught that way are "rough" fish, Wallace said, a giggling season may be legalized. If a majority of the catch are game fish, then the giggling will remain under a year-round ban.

The League of Kentucky Sportsmen has long opposed legalized giggling.

He said 13 of the nation's best bass-producing states permit giggling. They claim that bass and other "game" fish rarely can be speared by giggers because they are too lively.

The director said those wishing to take part in the experiment, which ends May 1, must obtain cards from a conservation officer and report results.

**Eastern State Gridders Announce 1949 Schedule**

Pollution control is definitely under way in Floyd county. The fight against this certain death to stream population and threat to the health of man is being backed by the pledged efforts of leading citizens and members of the Floyd County Fish and Game Club to compensate extra legal aid and personally assist in prosecuting cases in court in addition to a program of specific information to the public in general.

The spewing openings of spouting sewage, the uncontrolled industrial outlets spitting out their poisonous residue and flagrant disregard for the health and welfare of the county's rural, as well as community, citizenry is fast facing a good day of riddance to this unnecessary menace. This condition in the past has presented a state of filth unlimited.

The eventual arrival of this day, sincerely hoped for by those who realize the gravity of the situation, will aid in propagating the fish life which offers a delectable food for the table and alleviate the threat to human health consistently sounded by our medical authorities against even the common indulgence of swimming or bathing in the main streams of Floyd county.

**Effects Listed**

The common effects of pollution are damage or death to fish and wildlife, danger to human health, devaluation of property, restriction or prevention of outdoor recreation, loss of community prestige and attraction to tourists, additional costs for treating drinking water, offense from obnoxious odors, visual disgust and repulsion, loss of aesthetic values and interference with industrial uses and the watering of domestic animals. All of these effects have been painfully noted in Floyd county.

It's a well-known fact that organic pollution causes oxygen depletion. All material, capable of undergoing decay through bacterial action, combine with the dissolved oxygen of water and depletion to the extent unless reaction through turbulence of wind or aquatic plants at least equals the oxygen consuming rate of the polluting material. Common sources of oxygen consuming materials are sewage, sawdust, industrial waste, silt and garbage.

Oxygen depletion associated with organic waste, especially sewage, greatly increases the germ content of water and is considered by au-

**Basketball Rules Get Change**

**Rules-Makers Take Potshots At Defense Maneuvers, Order Contrasting Color Painted on Rims, Braces, Adopt Use of Moulded Ball—Effective In 1950**

Basketball's rules makers, holding this year's supreme sitting at Seattle recently for prime consideration of the laws governing the hardwood game, put a damper on drastic last minute maneuvers of the defense.

From now on each foul committed in the final 120 seconds will be charged to the offending player as a technical foul. The ball will be dead after the three throw attempt and the offended team then will take it out of bounds at center court.

At present the team fouled has the option of taking the ball out of bounds or shooting the free throw. Two charity tosses still will be given if a player is fouled in the act of shooting, but not for intentional fouling—as at present—unless unnecessary roughness is involved.

**Tie-Up Easier**  
To provide compensation for the team trailing, the committeemen voted to rewrite the rule governing withholding the ball from play to make it a little easier to tie up the ball.

Neither players nor spectators will be notified when the technical foul rule becomes effective. The official will be expected to watch the timer for a signal as to whether the two-minute period is under way when a foul is committed.

In high school games, the rule will go into effect with the first officials' timeout or dead ball that occurs after the first five minutes of the fourth quarter.

Committee Secretary H. V. Porter said the rule is designed to "make it more costly to intentionally foul" in the last minutes.

Designed to speed up action and equalize breaks as the game progresses, the committee also adopted a rule dealing with games played in quarters, such as high school games. The rule provides the ball will be put in play at the beginning of each

quarter by a jump from center. A number of other sections will be re-written and clarified, although the actual rules will remain the same.

**Other Changes**

1. No substitute will be allowed to replace a jumper after a held ball has been called. The jumper may be replaced after the jump.
2. Color of rim and ring braces of baskets will be painted bright orange and the rectangular target and the three-inch border.
3. Effective in 1950-51, a moulded ball without laces or seams will replace the model being used now. The rule will not become effective until 1950 to allow colleges to use up lace balls.
4. Glass blackboards are made mandatory for college games.



authorities a menace to public health. Such water is unsafe for bathing or drinking and is a potential source of harm to the community in which it exists.

**Offenders Named**

Every minute there is some from of this pollution entering our streams, and many communities may be using such water for drinking purposes without much purification. Hospitals, garbage dumps, human waste, coal mine washing, gas stations are chief causes. Oil from pumping, storage and piping operations, also refinery waste, present injuries in a combination of ways. Death by suffocation is caused when contact concentrations become sufficient so coat fish gills or the respiratory organs of aquatic animals. Oil films on water prevent absorption of oxygen from the air by water. Additionally, quantities of oil emulsified in water (mixed with) deplete dissolved oxygen. Certain portions of oil mixed with heavy materials sink, destroying fish spawning beds and killing fish food. Oil contacting aquatic plants and other plants bordering waters cause them to die and decay. Oil either causes direct injury to aquatic fowls and animals or starvation from destruction of food.

Examples of these are: United Fuel Gas Company at Warco and Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company at Dwale.

Iron sulfide and iron pyrites present in coal are acted upon by dissolved oxygen in water to produce Fe 504 (copperas), sulfuric acid (H2SO4), and sulfuric acid (H2SO4). Similarly the elemental sulfur of coal is oxidized to sulfuric acid. In addition to acid destruction, mining operations, especially coal washing, causes quantities of dust and silt to find its way into stream. This depleted oxygen shuts out light and does other damage such as covering up fish eggs with silt, making it impossible for fish to spawn.

Examples of those now doing this are Diamond Elkhorn, Hueysville, Elk Horn Coal Corporation, Wayland, and Princess Elkhorn Coal Company, David. Those that have corrected this type of pollution are Central Elkhorn Coal Company No. 3, Lackey, and Utility Elkhorn Coal Company, Martin.

**Miscellaneous Dumping**

The common practice of using streams and their banks as repositories for unwanted materials cannot be justified on the pretext of any explanation. Carcasses and garbage load streams with disease-producing germs, restricting recreation as well as offending the senses. Broken glass, crockery, tin cans with jagged edges, barbed wire and other refuse physically jeopardize swimmers, fishermen and others, contributes generally to accidents and disgust.

All of this type of pollution causes diseases which could be avoided by correction of the above polluting effects. Every year medical officers ask children to stay out of these streams which are diseased. Why not stand behind your conservation officer and get these streams cleaned up?

Examples of these can be found from the mouth of the Big Sandy to the head of all our small streams, including both Beaver Creeks and small tributaries.

**Sawdust Cause**

Wood and bark in general contain tannic acid. The principal damage to fish from sawdust is the leaching out of tannic acid into water. Sawdust, due to decomposition, uses up oxygen of water and, on settling, often destroys fish nests and food.


