CIRCUIT COURT Champ C. Osborne Dies DOCKET SCANT, Was World War Veteran HAS 112 CASES

Only One Murder Case Remains for Hearing; 26 Booze Cases Listed

The Floyd circuit court wil open its first criminal term of the new year here Monday with one of its slimmest dockets in years- in all, 112 cases.

Only one murder case remains on the docket, and that is the old charge against Ray Click, whose trial is slated for Jan. 10. If the trial is held, it will be the fifth be a record number for a Floyd circuit court defermant. Two of Click's trials resulted in "hung" juries, and verdicts in his other two trials were reversed by the Court of Appeals.

Almost half the cases on docket are for child desertion and liquor. Although a large number of liquor cases were dismissed at the last term of court, 26 remain to be heard, and all but one of these are docketed for trial Jan. 11.

Among the cases listed for trial during the term are four for drunk driving, five for rape, one for cutting and wounding, six for grand larceny, three for breaking and entering, two for hit-run driving and one for accepting a bribe while an officer.
