### Regional Library Here To Serve Five Counties If Plans Are Unchanged

Lt. Gov. Harry Lee Waterfield announced last Friday that Re-gion 3—Floyd, Morgan, Magoffin, Johnson and Martin counties has tentatively qualified to participate in the regional library development program as an extension of the Kentucky Bookmobile movement.

Headquarters of the region would be in Prestonsburg.

Floyd county qualified as headquarters for the regional li brary when the Floyd County HEALTH BLDG. fiscal court gave the state full assurances of cooperation.

The library headquarters will be located in the old Prestonsburg high school building.

Under the program four regional libraries will be set up each year until 15 have been established in the state. Kentucky will rethis year under the Library Servvices Act to set up the program.

The regional libraries will serve as headquarters for smaller, local libraries. Books in the regional libraries will be circulated among counties in the regions. The program will also supplement work of more than 100 Bookmo-

ROAD DEPT.

On Road Improvements Of About 75 Miles For Oct. 4 Letting

Frankfort, Sept. 24 (Spl.) —The Kentucky Department of Highways is seeking bids on additional road improvements totaling ap-

proximately 75 miles. These bids will be opened at the department here at 10 a.m., (CST) Oct. 4.

The early October bid opening will raise to about 800 the total mileage upon which road-improvement bids have been requested in recent weeks, starting

in August. The total includes many rural highway and farm-to-market road projects, involving much blacktopping. Projects on the interstate and primary highway systems also have been included.

For cost of interstate projects, the federal government provides \$9 for each \$1 put up by the state. On federal-aid primary and secondary roads, the federal and state governments divide the costs

Meantime Highway Department officials have termed "quite successful" their new right-of-way buying plan tried as an experiment at Catlettsburg recently.

Under the plan, the state carefully obtains at least two appraisals of property needed for right of way, reviews the appraisals and then establishes the average as the fair, market price. Damage by polluted rivers | The U. S. Public Health Servcosts America at least a billion dollars a year but new legislation and modern sewage disposal methods are bringing many rivers back to usefulness

So reports Peter Farb in an October Reader's Digest article. "Let's Clean Up All Rivers," condensed from National Municipal

The new Middlesex County Sewage Authority in Northern New Jersey has built a 30-million dollar pipeline and sewage disposal system that will allow the Raritan River to flow clean next year for the first time in nearly half a century. The new system will take care of waste from 19 municipalities and nine industries -about 100 million gallons of sewage per day.

The scrubbing given the Raritan is being duplicated across the United States. In the last seven years Kansas has built or contracted for 200 new sewage-treatment plants, and almost all the rivers in the state are washed clean. In Illinois, 95 per cent of the sewage systems are now the modern disposal type. The beautiful Willamette River in Oregon is being cleaned up, and salmon Has Most Modern are running by the millions again. Even the grimy Ohio River New Building is getting a bath.







Principal provisions of the amendment are those establishing nine-member constitutional State Board of Education which will appoint a Commissioner of Education to handle the duties of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, now an elective office. Backers of the amendment point out that the "staggering" of terms of the board members as provided in the proposed law will prevent any succeeding Governor from gaining control of a majority of board appointments.

An application and charter fee of \$2 is charged each club and good as long as the club maintains a continuous year-to-year existence in the same school. Individual memberships are \$1 a

It is not required, but the school library should be a subscriber to the state historical journal, The Register of the Ken-

Each club must have a local historian and a history-teacher for sponsors. At least one of these two must be a member of the Kentucky Historical Society. Each club above the sixth-grade level must, in addition to the history sponsors, have an English teacher advisor.



In the meantime, Joe Jack, whose father had come to this country from Austria, was being tried for murder. He was accused of deliberately blowing up the mine and killing the men whose "prepared bodies" were found in the rubble.

Judge Daugherty received a \$10,000 fee for his service in defending Joe Jack, who was brought back from Austria to face trial. "I might have got more," he chuckled, "but the insurance com-
