The grand jury, the report said, questioned more than 100 witnesses during its investigation of widespread rumors concerning the handling of absentee ballots at the August primary. Among these witnesses, it was pointed out, were County Clerk DuRan Moore, an election commissioner Let me just suggest that for and various candidates in the primary, including one of the other candidates for County Clerk.

This part of the report declared that "we failed to find any evidence where the County Clerk, DuRan Moore or any of his office deputies, violate the absentee ballot law, but we do believe that there were some irregularities in the handling of absentee ballots by persons other than the County Clerk.

The jury recommended that the absentee ballot law be changed to make only service personnel and students away from home eligible to vote in absentia.

#### Poachers Kill Deer In Dewey Lake Refuge, Biologist Here Says

A deer in the Dewey Lake preserve was killed recently by poachers, District Biologist Howard M. Stephens said.

The deer, a doe, was one of the original herd released in the lake area, he said. It was found in the Copperas Creek section and had been killed by a shotgun charge. The animal had been dead about five days when found.

The game refuge around the lake has been badly violated all summer and fall by squirrel-hunters. Squirrel-hunting there has been described as "wholesale," and few if any arrests of poachers have been made.

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

## **COUNTY JUDGE**

In this week's discussion of the issues between Stumbo and myself for County Judge I want to say that it is only fair for a man who asks questions to answer those asked him. In this article I will answer Henry's questions, as if he didn't know the answers already, and at the end of this article I want to ask a few questions of my opponent and I want something in answer to them, no evasion, denials and half-

Early in my term as Sheriff my deputies arrested the bootleggers when they found intoxicants on the premises and they were placed under bond. We found out that some very weak bonds were accepted in your court. After we found out your court would accept this type of bond we changed our method of operations.

If we searched a man and found intoxicants on his premises we told him to come into your court and fill bond and bring a bondsman with him, on advice of U. S. Marshal Wince Trimble. This system was forced upon us by you and your friends. All people who have been raided were indicted in Circuit Court, County Court, or Magistrate Court. If you know of anyone who was not indicted it was your duty to come forth and name them before the Grand Jury.

Witnesses are mighty important in convicting a bootlegger, Judge. I believe you know more about how we have tried to get witnesses into your court than anybody except ourselves. My deputies wore out three automobiles coming to your court only to find the liquor cases laid over. Then, later when none of my deputies were around cases would be called and dismissed for lack of witnesses. You pulled that on us dozens of times. My deputies couldn't park in your office day after day to watch you. They were charged with the enforcement of the law. Didn't you tell the Magistrates that you didn't want to try whisky cases in your court anyway?

It is only right that the public know what becomes of the liquor seized in raids, as it is only right that the public know what became of the case after the bootlegger was raided. When Magistrate John May's home burned there were approximately 75 cases of whiskey and 150 cases of beer in his basement that we had seized. The whiskey taken in Magisterial District No. 3 went to Magistrate Ellis Martin. A quantity also was taken to Magistrate Holbrook. A large amount of intoxicants was turned over to Wince Trimble, U. S. Marshal, to be taken to Federal Court, and to the State Police when they were in the raid. There is whiskey and beer stored in my office now and most of it was taken from men whose cases you dismissed. Henry you have a lot of whiskey and beer turned into your court, where is

Now, Judge, I have honestly and fairly tried to answer your questions so here are a few square answers I want from you.

1. Who issues the Roadhouse permits to the bootlegging joints?

You wouldn't deny issuing them, would you?

2. Who has the power to cancel these permits if bootlegging

is found to be going on at the place? You woudn't deny that you have that power, would you? 3. Have you cancelled any Roadhouse permits, Judge? If

you were forced to cancel one by public opinion, hasn't he been eased back in business at the same old stand when the public wasn't 4. Why haven't you cancelled the permit of the Dewey Lake

Association as it has paid FOUR bootlegging fines in Edgar Howell's

5. Why are certain bootleggers allowed to operate a Roadhouse on other people's permits?

6. Why haven't you stopped the Miners Club at Hunter, and who operates it in defiance of the court? Wasn't a man killed there a few months ago and hasn't the club been raided several times? Judge, could it be the operator is close friend or relative?

7. Where is all the liquor and beer that was taken in the twelve

years you were judge and magistrate?

8. Where is the liquor that was taken from Dora Johnson by the county patrol a few months ago? Didn't she follow your patrol to Ellis Martin's office and ask why ALL of it wasn't turned over to him?

9. Now Henry, tell us about the gas and water deal?

I am asking these questions in the name of all decent, law-abiding citizens and I want square, truthful answers.

In a recent issue of the Floyd County Times my opponent, Henry Stumbo, talked of qualifications, integrity and ability. I shall state

my qualifications here and ask him to do likewise. I have four years of college and taught school two years. I have worked as a laborer and understand the problems of the man who labors for a living with his hands. I have been in business and what measure of success I have had is attributable to my education, knowl-

edge of business affairs and hard work. I spent two years overseas in Germany and France in World War II and when I was discharged I went into business at Lackey. I was successful in a small way because my neighbors and the laboring people of the area who were my customers gave me their confidence







## The \$64,000 Question

Gormon Collins, the Republican candidate for County Judge, wants to engage in a question and answer campaign. The following list of questions and answers was taken from an actual case against a former deputy sheriff on trial in the Floyd Circuit Court on a charge of accepting a bribe. This is an actual court record of a trial on November 26, 1956.

"TESTIMONY OF WITNESS NO. 1:

"Q-15 Go ahead.

We came down to \_\_\_\_\_ place, more or less a bootlegging joint, and we went in the back; she had a little room in the back where she sold beer and stuff, and he told us that he wanted to explain what protection we would get and that Gormon Collins sent him out and he told us if we didn't believe he was the kind of man he was saying he was, and we all decided that he was all right."

"Q-25 Did you get what was promised you, protection?

Yes, sir. I never was bothered by the county sheriff."

"Q-114 I want to ask you one further question. You tell the jury that as you went along bootlegging there, on up, maybe, a year or a little over a year, or something like that without being bothered. What happened there? Did you finally quit bootlegging or what happened?

No, I was still in the business. Something went wrong some way. — , he told me that —

#### TESTIMONY OF WITNESS NO. 2:

"Q-17 What did he say to you?

He wanted to know if I wanted in on the pay-off and I commenced talking to him and I told him I did not understand it, and-and he told me then that Mr. Collins had them out collecting for him; that it wasn't going to him but was going to Mr. Collins and he told me, he said: "Looks like you can pay as much as \$10.00 a week and sell on and if you don't, you will have to quit," and he said: "If you pay as much as \$10.00 a week you can sell on and if you don't, you will have to quit."

"Q-20 Now, did you get that protection?

A- Well, I got it up until the first Monday after Christmas.

"Q-21 Did something happen then?

The man that was collecting, he said he wouldn't be around anymore.

"Q-29 Dif you pay \_\_\_\_\_?

Yes, sir. He said he would put my name down so Mr. Collins would know who it was coming from."

TESTIMONY OF WITNESS NO. 3:

Tell the jury what connections you had along that line, if any.

Well, I paid the defendant \$20.00 a week to operate my place of business at East Point.

Why did you pay him \$20.00 a week?

Well, he just said it would furnish protection from the sheriff's force.

"Q-10 Well, did it?

Well, I never was bothered by the sheriff's force aft er that.

"Q-11 Was that in Floyd county, Kentucky?

Yes, sir."

TESTIMONY OF WITNESS NO. 4:

What was the line of his conversation?

The only time that he ever had any conversation was the first time and he just told me if I stayed in business I would have to pay off, and the other times was when I would stop and buy gas off of him.'

It is in order for Mr. Collins to answer these questions for the people of this county:

- 1. Who hired the attorneys to defend this former deputy?
- 2. How were these lawvers paid?
- Why did you, Mr. Collins, advise with this man and consult with him and his attorneys during this trial?
- Why would you be interested in this man if he had made false statements about you?
- 5. Where did the money come from that was used to defend a deputy for killing a man on the streets of Prestons-

When you were a candidate for sheriff, Mr. Collins, you said this in the Floyd County Times on September 10, 1953.

"The taxpayers of this county have been paying a big price for the results they have been getting. The Sheriff's office pays enough money in fees for collecting taxes and fees for all other services that it performs to be able to maintain a good force of officers and pay them a fair salary. It pays enough to give the people good law enforcement and still be able to turn money back into the county treasury."

- 1. How much money have you turned back into the County Treasury?
- 2. How much did the Sheriff's office cost you?
- 3. How did you get this money back?

The past Grand Jury in its report dated September 27, 1957, had this to say about the way you conducted your office.

"We have questioned some 225 witnesses and returned approximately 142 indictments and during our investigations we questioned numerous witnesses. including deputy sheriffs and find that there is still a great deal of law violations and bootlegging going on in Floyd county. During our investigation we discovered that the Sheriff of Floyd county has in his possession a large quantity of alcohol beverages and we believe that since the law requires an officer to execute a search warrant to seize and take possession of the articles found and deliver them unto the Court, issuing the search warrant and this failing to have done, we feel that this Court should see that the said liquor and beer is legally disposed of."

What is your answer to this charge by the Grand Jury?

The people want to know, Mr. Collins. They are looking for your answers to these questions.

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





#### IN PRAISE OF THE PONE

If you believe "Man cannot live by bread alone," you've never eaten Kentucky corn bread.

This observation leads us to the Mrs. O. J. Williams, with a profact that Gov. A. B. Chandler has proclaimed Oct. 7-13 Corn Bread Week in Kentucky.

So advises the Kentucky Millers Association during that week it will be appropriate to make your "staff of life" out of corn meal.

Just in case you haven't counted them lately, there are 107 corn meal millers in the Commonwealth. This interesting statistic comes from Jim Sutherland, of Bloomfield, chairman of the ssociation's publicity committee.

Corn pones used to be a favorite Kentucky delicacy. Some enthusiasts made them about four inches long and as thick as man's wrist. The batter was compounded of water-mill meal, boiling water, a pinch of salt and a teaspoon of lard. As the pones cooked, bacon drippings were allowed to fall on them.

#### Hunter Beware! Of Rabbit Fever State Warns

Although hunters can't start shooting at rabbits until November 20, the first day of the season, licenses are already on sale at county court clerks' offices throughout Kentucky. In many counties hunters will be given in addition to their licenses a billfold-size card, the color of a caution light, which proclaims the words written above, "Hunter Be-

Issued by the Kentucky State Department of Health, the cards have been made available to all county court clerks in an effort to avoid any cases of tularemia

this fall. The bacteria which cause tularemia can be transmitted to man from rabbits and other wild animals by means of fly or tick bites or through the skin of the person dressing the meat or through. eating the meat rare. A very uncomfortable disease, though seldom fatal, tularemia causes body sores, swollen lymph glands, weakness and fever.

From the yellow card, hunters and housewives can learn the following precautions to observe for avoiding this disease:

1. Shoot your rabbits on the run. A lazy rabbit may be a sick

Never handle a rabbit found dead or brought in by a dog or 3. Always wear rubber gloves

when dressing a rabbit.


