Ferguson asked that Martin, Oates, Rural Highway Commissioner J. B. Wells, Jr., and others be barred from paying the Hall firm an additional \$7,205 in checks now being held in the Finance Department.

To date Hall has been paid \$51,480 and C. & C. has been paid \$15,480 under equipment-rental

"The so-called contracts under which these companies have been paid are not only void for lack of general authority in the Department of Highways to make such contracts without competitive bidding, but they reveal serious irregularities in procedure in both the Department of Highways and the Department of Finance," Ferguson said in a statement.

The Attorney General's petition asked that Richard Hall, Knott County Judge Dennis Sturgill and former Knott Tax Commissioner Audry W. Collins, all of Hindman, partners in the firms, be barred from seeking or accepting payment of any additional amount.

State Treasurer Henry H. Carter was named as defendant in the suits, but his connection is only nominal, Ferguson said. The treasurer is required by law to prepare state checks on warrants issued by the Finance Depart-

Carter is listed as a defendant solely to establish his legal right to refuse to honor any future warrant that may be drawn in favor of the two firms, Ferguson Also named defendant were O.

J. West, Pikeville, Highway Department district engineer, and David (Sonny) Hall, of Topmost, father of Richard Hall and Highway Department road supervisor in Knott county.

The suits grew out of work done by the Highway Department during April, May, June, July, August, September, and October of this year on 13 Knott county roads. Funds used came from the state's 2-cent-a-gallon gasoline tax for rural and secondary road work.

Ferguson's petition charges that it was not until last June 11-after a substantial part of the Knott county work was donethat the department approved plans and specifications for the construction work and assigned numbers to the 13 projects.

Instructions to build the roads were signed and sent out on that date by George A. Hailey, director of the Division of Rural Highways in the Highway Department.

The petitions state that, in the construction work, Wells, West, and David Hall made use of road equipment and operators supplied by Richard Hall, Sturgill and Collins, doing business under the two firm names.

The Hall petition says that Wells, West, and David Hall 'undertook to agree that the Commonwealth of Kentucky would pay to the defendants Richard Hall, Dennis Sturgill, Audry Collins, and others not known to the

an hour for the D-6 Caterpillar. The petition said this action of Martin and Oates was without the knowledge or approval of the attorney general, without authority, and contrary to the law.

The equipment involved was not owned by the Hall firm, but rented by it from the Licking River Limestone Company, West Liberty. The West Liberty firm received hourly rentals of \$15 for the Caterpillar with pan, and \$11 for the two other machines. Ferguson's petition does not deal with that phase of the case, how-

Ferguson's petition said the agreements to rent or lease the equipment from Hall and C. & C. violated the Highway Department's own executive order, Bulletin No. 2344, that has been in effect since June 7, 1952.

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#### New Jobs and Old in a New Year

As the old year draws toward its close there is a small group of Floyd countians who perhaps are thinking more seriously than most of us of the year ahead and how they will meet its challenge. Certainly they should be thinking along these lines, for these are the newly elected county officials who will begin new jobs as public servants or who, in a few cases, will begin new tenure of old offices.

If these leaders will stop now to take stock of themselves, analyze their concept of government and inquire into their duty to the people; if they will consider those who elected them not as so many voters but as human beings with real needs and deserving as individuals, not as so many numbers in a precinct —then those who face these positions of responsibility will have gone a long way toward rendering the honest, faithful service of which we have heard so much in the months behind.

THE TIMES does not presume to serve as counsellor to each of these officials, or even to one, but it would remind them all that the best politics is no politics. We recommend that each try hewing to the line, letting the chips fall, so to speak, dealing impartially between individuals for the good of the whole. We are not so naive that we think any man elected in a political campaign can ever be entirely free of politics, but we do maintain that he does not need to let politics and political considerations dominate him, his motives and official acts in disdain for the oath of office he takes.

Each official has a big job to do. Some have tasks that are more difficult than others, particularly those who are to undertake the job of law enforcement. But the same principle applies to each: avoid the tangled web of petty politics, stay on the side of law and order, avoid the advice of so-called friends who have an axe to grind and get on with the work.

Mistakes will be made, true, but holders of public office will be pleasantly surprised with the ability of good, solid citizens to distinguish between mistakes of the mind and those of the heart,

#### Succession of Sixth Governor Disputed

Gabriel Slaughter, who served almost a full term as governor, was the only lieutenant governor whose right to follow the governor in line of succession was seriously questioned.

nors have died in office and six have resigned since Kentucky became a state in 1792. All four of Kentucky's constitutions contain the phrase, "until another be duly (elected and) qualified, "which may be interpreted to imply that if the office of the governor is permanently vacated by the elected incumbent, the lieutenant governor or speaker (pro-tem) would act as governor only until another could be elected to fill out the unexpired term.

Gov. George Madison died October 14, 1816. Who was to fill out Madison's term? The lieutenant governor, Gabriel Slaughter? Slaughter did assume the duties of governor a week later, but was he only to hold office until a new election could be conducted?

Article III, Section 18, of the Constitution of 1800 reads:

In case of the impeachment of the Governor, his removal from office, death, refusal to qualify, resignation, or absence from the State, the Lieutenant Governor shall exercise all the power and authority apertaining to the office of Governor, until another be duly qualified, or the Governor absent or impeached shall return or be acquitted.

Some thought that this section should be construed broadly, following the example of the United States Constitution which provides that the vice president shall succeed the president under similar circumstances.

Others recognized the probable intent of the fathers of the Constitution that no governor should serve unless specifically elected by the voters. Therefore, said the opponents of Slaughter, an election must be held.

A bill providing for a special election passed the House in 1817 by a heavy majority, but failed to pass the more conservative Senate by a vote of 14 to 18.

No other serious attempt was made in Slaughter's administration to have a gubernatorial election, and he continued in office as acting governor until 1820, when he was succeeded in a regular election by John Adair.

Slaughter was born, like many of the early governors, in Virginia. He died and was buried in
