iel McCoy and Peggy Taylor who married in Floyd county, February 12, 1819. The feud leader was born ca 1821, died 1914. He was married in 1849.

My correspondent, a capable genealogist and former postmaster at Meta, Pike county, writes of the genealogical background of the McCoys:

"I believe that Samuel Mc-Coy who is in the 1810 Census (Floyd county) 'was Daniel's father. He was over 45 years old in 1810, which would have made him born before 1765. Probably all those early McCoys were brothers to Daniel. All of which is guesswork, however.

Children of Randolph and Sarah McCoy were James, Tolbert, Phamer, Twinnie, Josephine, Alifair, Rosanna, Adelaide, Randolph, Jr., Floyd, Sam, Calvin, Fanny, and William. Virgil Carrington Jones, in his book, THE HATFIELDS AND THE McCOYS, lists only 13 children of the union of Randolph and Sarah McCoy. He doesn't list a William. The spelling, however, of any list varies. Alifair is spelled with two I's by

Mr. Elliott, in behalf of the Methodist hospital's directors, said they concurred completely in the objectives of the merger, and added:

"The acquisition of the ARH hospital presents the Methodist Church with a great challenge. It also presents an opportunity for continuation of the high level of hospital care which has been provided by both hospitals. We of the Methodist Church accept the challenge and opportunity to enter into an even larger area of service."

Under the agreement, the Methodist hospital will assume responsibility for payment of a \$492,410 mortgage which the federal government holds on the Pikeville ARH hospital. The Methodist hospital also pledges itself to retain the approximately 81 employees of the ARH hospital and to endeavor to maintain their present wage scale. The Methodist hospital has 250 employees.
