View 10-Acre Site For Third Project

Prestonsburg's second low-rent housing complex, Indian Hills, is expected to open next month, and by summer third may be under construction. It was said herein week.

An appraisal of a 10-acre site in Goble-Roberts addition is being made at the third complex. The appraisal filed with the Housing Assistance Administration by the Prestonsburg Municipal Housing Commission has been approved preliminary plans are being prepared, and land acquisition is next on the agenda. The architect predicts that a contract for construction will be let in June or July.

When this project is completed, Prestonsburg will have 160 owner and 15 rent-supplement housing units available. The original Green Acres housing development has 40 units; Indian Hills now nearing completion at the mouth of May's Branch here, will have 42, and the proposed development in the Goble-Roberts Addition will have 78 units.

3 WOUNDED BY GUNFIRE

Marsillett, Alleged
Shotgun User, Names
Others in Warrants

Three Magoffin county men who were wounded by shotgun blasts late Monday night on State Road Park of Middle Creek face charges of threatening another with a deadly weapon.

The charges were filed with Magistrate Bill Wells by Paul Marsillett, who was named by the wounded man as the man who shot them.

Two of the wounded — Glenn and Jim Sparks — are in the Prestonsburg General hospital. The former was severely, though not believed dangerously, wounded. He was struck in his back and arms by an undetermined number of pellets. Jim Sparks was shot in the side and arm but not as seriously as his brother.

The third man hit by a shot was Bill Shepherd, whose wounds in neck and head were not severe enough to keep him out of jail.

Marsillett told Magistrate Wells the three had threatened him, that one was hidden in the barn near his home and that they were armed with shotguns. The wounded men said Shepherd and Marsillett had had earlier trouble. They said they had driven up State Road Park and had left their car to walk where Shepherd's sister lived when they were fired upon.

A warrant for Marsillett's arrest had not been issued, Tuesday morning.

Claim Rule Could Halt Roadbuilding

Governor Louie B. Nunn and Commissioner of Highways W. B. Hazelrigg have registered strong protests against a new ruling issued by the Federal Highway Administration which, in effect, will enable any individual or group opposed to a highway to halt it, at least temporarily.

The new rules provide that instead of a single hearing on a highway project, as has heretofore been required, most projects would henceforth be subjected to two hearings: one at the broad corridor through which the highway must be built, and on the road's detailed design and the impact of its potential construction.

The rules, issued by Federal Highway Administrator Lowell K. Bridwell, would apply to all projects partly financed by federal funds. This includes Interstate System freeways as well as major improvements to city streets, primary and secondary routes. Not only would "interested persons" be able to question whether the roads should be built, or even widened, but rules also require highway departments to consider killing the road projects in favor of other forms of transportation, presumably rail rapid transit.

FLU VACCINE SUPPLY SEEN

Hong Kong Virus
Not Detected Here,
Spread Seen Later

The shortage of vaccine to combat an expected Hong Kong flu epidemic in Kentucky is expected to be relieved next week with the arrival of a large shipment of vaccine to go to hospitals and private physicians.

The vaccine for this particular type of influenza is almost nonexistent in this county at this time. Some vaccine has been received and used but the remaining supply was negligible, it was said Tuesday.

Dr. George P. Archam of the Prestonsburg General hospital, said he had found the incidence of influenza this fall no heavier than normal. He added that without isolation of the virus and tests such as are available in laboratories of larger cities it is impossible to say if flu of the Hong Kong variety has appeared in the county.

State Health Commissioner Russell Teague said Monday the big manufacturers of the vaccine have stepped up production and will release the serum on a mass basis as the new year begins.

Meantime, he said, priority is going to people 55 and older with chronic diseases such as heart disease.

They should obtain a shot immediately, he said, and it will take effect in a week or 10 days. Teague said the latest available figures indicate the current strain of influenza is climbing towards the epidemic stage which he said probably would be reached in the third week of January.

A couple of weeks ago the flu cases reported by doctors totaled more than 400.

A week ago the count rose to more than 800 and "this week we'll probably have up to 3,000 cases reported," the commissioner said.

The actual count is considerably greater since many milder cases are not treated by physicians and never enter into the statistics.

Dr. C. Hernandez, state director of epidemiology, said a usual rule of thumb is that there are four times the number of reported cases.

Teague said one comfort despite the rising incidence is the lack of any recorded death in Kentucky from flu or pneumonia like ailments.

Nationally, he said, the death rate has been four times the expectations for the flu epidemic.

The main effect in Kentucky at the moment is heavy absenteeism in industries. When schools resume in a few days, Teague said, there also will be many empty seats.

The presence of the Hong Kong flu virus has been verified officially in laboratories, especially by samples from Louisville and Lexington.

Hospitals and nursing homes have reported scattered cases of Hong Kong flu.

Few Incidents Mar Quiet of Holidays

The holidays, generally, were quiet in Floyd county.

Even the roar of "cherry bombs" and other fireworks was more scattered than usual.

One pre-Christmas automobile fatality and a post-Christmas shooting in which nobody was killed ranged beyond the ordinary train of events.

In the 10-day period, Dec. 21-Dec. 31, 22 persons were jailed here. Eleven of these were booked for drunkenness.

On the liquor front one raid was staged by Sheriff's deputies, two days before Christmas. This resulted in the arrest of Landon Charles, Brandy Keg road merchant, on a charge of possessing intoxicating beverages for the purpose of sale. Search of his premises by Deputy Sheriffs Claude Flanery and John Reed and State Trooper Bevins uncovered 20½ pints of whiskey, gin and vodka and 52 cans of beer. Charles executed bond.

A 16-year-old youth, jailed here December 20, was booked on seven charges of breaking

Soldier Is Charged In Auto Fatality

Pfc. Michael C. Hamilton, a Fort Lewis, Washington soldier home on furlough, has been placed under \$2,000 bond to answer to action of the grand jury here next week in the automobile death December 22 of Billy Bryan Adkins, 22, of Martin, and the injury of three others.

Hamilton, a former East McDowell resident, waived examining trial last Friday after he had been charged with manslaughter.

Adkins died at Our Lady of the Way hospital, Martin, about 2:30 a.m., shortly after the auto in which he was a passenger was forced from KY 89, near the housing development outside Martin.

Seriously injured and taken to University Medical Center, Lexington, for treatment were David Lee Grigsby, 30, of Martin, driver of the car in which Adkins and others were passengers, and band instructor at McDowell high school, and Harvey McKinney, Jr., 26, of Printer. A third passenger in the Grigsby car, Junior Hunt, of Hunter, suffered cuts and bruises and was taken to Our Lady of the Way hospital.

Grigsby, a son of Mayor E. P. Grigsby, of Martin, underwent surgery at the Lexington hospital. His right leg was twice broken and he suffered possible internal injuries. His improvement is slow. McKinney's cheek bone was fractured. He also had a broken foot and suffered a concussion.

Hamilton's injuries were described as minor.

Martin Police Chief A. J. Reed, who joined State Trooper Michael Angel in an investigation of the tragedy, told authorities here there was evidence the car driven by Hamilton and Grigsby's auto made contact prior to the wreck. It was claimed Hamilton attempted to pass Grigsby, with the result that Grigsby's auto was hit and forced from the highway.

Hamilton's injuries were described as minor.

The victim, who had ended four years of Marine Corps service only a month prior to his death, was a son of Henry Lee and three sisters, Monroe Slone, and Lizzie Frazier Adkins, of Martin. Other survivors are four sisters, Mrs. Wanda Lee Bentley, Chelsea, Mich., Mrs. Marceline Lewis, Detroit, Mich., Mrs. Helen Slone, of Garrett, and Mrs. Myrtle Caudill, of Hindman.

Jan. Court Docket Marks Crime Drop

The steady dwindling of circuit court dockets in this county over a period of several years is emphasized by the January docket, which lists only 35 cases for trial. Several years ago, the docket regularly contained 150 or more cases, and even more recently there were as many child desertion cases set for trial at a single court term as the total number to be heard this month.

Asked what he considers responsible for the slimmer dockets, Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J. Stumbo said this week that certainly it isn't because grand juries aren't digging into crime—it's simply because there isn't as much crime. One murder case is on the docket. The murder rate has been steadily declining in this county.

He expressed the belief that federal programs which have bettered the lot of many of the unemployed and underprivileged has by meeting economic needs reduced adult thievery and the number of child desertion cases. Education, Stumbo added, is perhaps the greatest builder of a more law-abiding population. The law against carrying concealed deadly weapons also was cited.

Another factor in the reduction of court dockets is the removal of old cases from the docket. These include those cases in which the defendants have not been found — mainly, because the court has been dead.

MARTIN HAS 2nd SCHOOL BLAZE LOSS

Grade School Burns
Early This Morning;
Gym Burned in Sept.

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed the grade school at Martin this morning (Thursday), a few hours before classes were scheduled to be resumed after the holiday vacation.

The loss was the second within a period of four months to the Martin schools. The school gymnasium there burned, early last September.

The blaze in the two-story brick structure was discovered at 3:30 a.m., and had spread to such extent that efforts of four fire departments were unable to save the school. The Martin fire department was joined in saving other buildings—one, a small frame building between the gymnasium and the grade school which had been saved when the gym burned—by firemen from Prestonsburg, Allen and the Left Beaver Civil Defense group.

The nearby high school building apparently was protected from damage, but it will not open for classwork until facilities for the grade school pupils are found.

County Superintendent of Schools Charles Clark said every effort will be made to keep the grade pupils in Martin and that a search for classroom space has already been begun there.

Space for 12 classrooms is needed. Any building or buildings selected for use, however, must be approved by the Division of Buildings and Grounds, State Department of Education. The superintendent expects classwork to resume within a week.

No estimate of the loss was available. The building was insured for \$75,000 and its fixtures for \$3,000. "That wouldn't build the first floor at today's prices," Clark commented.



He also leaves five grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.



of the best teachers I ever had, a world-renowned folklorist, used to say that it was certainly a queer way to judge a scholar's ability merely by the name of the school he attended. And he could have been haughty, for, a country boy in origin, he had graduated from old Harvard itself. Only when it was necessary for the record did this information ever leak out; he preferred to stand on his own record and not dodge behind his alma mater.

Somehow these evidences of grown-up men and women and their prejudices reminds me of the traditional story of the two boys who tell each other about the merits of their respective fathers: "My dad can lick your dad." Actually, with all our growing up, as individuals and as communities and as a nation, we sometimes keep the folksy attitude that we knew when we were small boys and had to rely on the prowess of some older brother or Pappy himself. I have often wished, as a college teacher, that I could dare to laugh at this loyalty that has gone wrong. No wonder some wise people who have had few opportunities to acquire an education sometimes laugh at the obvious pretensions of us inside the Inner Circle. And that reminds me of the very forceful preacher who said that if he knew that he had a drop of blood that was not Methodist—let us say, since I am a Methodist—he would open the blood vessel right then and let it out. I used to ask my students just how he would determine which drop was Methodist and which wasn't.

gone through the Federal Register."

Observing that the new rules can effectively delay any project through a "simple appeal" by any opponent, he added that "by making it a federal rule, it's going to make it very easy to bring litigation."

"Why, someone can even question whether you should build an eight-inch or a nine-inch pavement," Johnson said.

Johnson pointed out that presently 235 miles of 6,800 miles of urban Interstate freeways are involved in controversy. "Every controversial project will be stopped," he declared. "This will encourage dissident groups to bog down any project they wish."

Asked what action AASHO intends to take, he said: "Well, every one of the State highway departments are going to be talking individually with the Governors and their Congressmen. It seems to me that anything filed with the Federal Highway Administration in opposition to these rules will have no effect whatever. So it looks to me as though we'll have to depend on Congress. We most certainly will make a strong appeal to Congress to abolish these rules."

Johnson observed that this latest action was particularly staggering, coming as it does in the wake of the latest cutback in the highway program. "It just seems that there are some people who don't want us to build any roads," he said.

Senior Citizens Kitchen Weapon in Poverty Fight

A country kitchen doesn't sound like the normal site to fight a battle but at Boone Fork in Letcher county cooking has become a weapon in the war on poverty.

This particular kitchen is special. It is the Senior Citizens Kitchen, funded through the Letcher, Knott, Leslie and Perry (LKKP) Community Action Council by the Office of Economic Opportunity for nearly \$45,000 last July.

Administered by the Boone Fork Community Group, the kitchen serves seven small Eastern Kentucky communities (Sap, Whitaker, Neon, Hemp hill, Fleming, McRoberts and Crooked) and provided with modern equipment, operates out of a two-story white frame building which also houses the Boone Fork Day Care Center. The emphasis is on upgrading the food practices of the communities and the Senior Citizens Kitchen is demonstrating several different ways to do it.

Perhaps the most colorful activity of the kitchen is the five-day-a-week delivery of hot meals to indigent, house-confined elderly citizens in the surrounding hills. These free meals are delivered by staff members and are tasty examples of nutritious and economical food planning. The communities served by the kitchen must finance this portion of the program and the major appeal has been to young groups to sponsor fund-raising projects. Through these projects, the communities served by the kitchen are caring for the elderly.

The kitchen is now developing plans to provide entertainment and social involvement for the elderly. Perhaps the way to a community's heart is through day after day with no contact in its stomach.

Since December is not known as one of our better fishing months, except to some far-north ice fishermen and some far-south deep-lake anglers, let's talk about updating that miserable-looking tackle box you lug around last year.

It's probably bulging with stuff stashed in every inch of available space. And most of it either went unused or did very little catching when it was used.

The majority of my fish were caught on two or three dozen lures. I know the ones that came through, and so do you. So, why set those drosses cluttering up good space? Why not really get that tackle box in shape for some hardheaded fishing in '69?

The first move is to take everything out of the box. I mean everything—the oil seepage, sand, dried gobs of insecticide and so forth. Then lay all lures on a big table according to their categories, and sizes: Surface lures in this grouping, floating-diving lures there, sinking lures here and bottom-feeding types over there. Ditto with accessories, tools, stringers, lure knocker, spare odds and ends, and so on.

When everything is out of the box, you'll wonder (1) how you got all that conglomeration in the box, (2) why you carried around so much stuff all year and (3) how you can pare it to the bone for the coming season.

Then all the accessories are placed according to their frequency of use. The ones you reach for most often should be at handiest.

After the less-worthy lures have been eliminated, it's time where they're handiest.

Justice Jenkins, district supervisor for Kentucky for OEO's Mid-Atlantic region, warned directors of each of the state's poverty programs to expect a cut in funds when their annual grants come up for renewal.

He said there is 20 per cent less money to be divided among the various programs.

Kentucky has had as much as \$17 million. Even this, Jenkins notes, is above the \$14 million Kentucky should have, based on a formula for the number of poor persons in the state.

Several poverty programs have been cut back substantially already because of the money shortage and five have been permanently "defunded." Louisville's program was cut by some 25 per cent and the Knox County Economic Opportunity Council was reduced nearly 30 per cent. Both are considered by OEO as outstanding programs.

Programs which are being dropped this year include: The Rough River Area Council, Hardinsburg; the Purchase Area Economic Opportunity Council, Paducah; the Lower Cumberland Area Development Council, Kuttawa, and the South Central Kentucky Area Development Council, Glasgow.

OEO maintained that each of these programs failed in its efforts to help the poor.

Jenkins also reported that in the next few months OEO will single out 10 to 13 of the state's 22 poverty programs for special "concentrated technical assistance."

These will be programs, he said, which have demonstrated "real potential." The other programs will apparently either have to make good on their own or face eventual extinction.

Nature Trails By RUFUS M. REED

Shrubs and Plants To Protect

The shrubs and small trees described herein should be well-protected for their role in feeding the birds and other wildlife, especially during winter. Many of these can be transplanted with success; some do not need this, but should be allowed to grow on the farm wherever possible.

1. THE SUMACS. These are among our finest shrubs and small trees. They produce abundantly large, red seed-pods which stand up conspicuously in winter, inviting the birds to come and dine. The robins, cardinals, towhees, catbirds and about 100 other species dine on sumac pods. These bear abundant seeds with a sour taste, but the birds don't mind this. The seed-pods are used by Boy Scouts to make "Indian lemonade."

We have three species of sumacs in our region. These grow in old fields, clearings and along streams. They often grow in poor soils of hillsides and their glowing, scarlet leaves set our hills ablaze in October. The three species are the Staghorn Sumac, the Dwarf or Wingribbed Sumac and the Smooth Sumac.

These often grow together. The Dwarf Sumac, also called the "shining sumac," is the most beautiful of all. Its long, compound leaves glisten in the bright sun like silver. Between the leaflets there are wings on the midrib of the leaf; so it is called "the wing-ribbed sumac." It blooms about July and produces a large flower pyramid with many small, greenish-yellow blossoms. These produce the large, brilliant-red seed-pods, which stand upright on the branches in winter. This is a fine tree for ornamental planting and will grow about 20 feet high. The wood is soft and stained yellow.

The Wild Plum. Our wild plums can be transplanted and make fine ornamentals. They bloom early in the spring and have a showy mass of sheer white blossoms, which are eagerly sought by the winter-hungry bees. This small tree furnishes the first real early food for the starving bees. It produces an abundant crop of small, red plums, sweet and edible, which are used to make jellies and preserves. The fruit is eaten by many birds and animals as well as people. The wild plum will grow in thin soils and helps to prevent erosion. It can also be used as a stock on which to graft domestic plums. The blooms have a sweet perfume and are usually swarming with many kinds of bees in early spring. The wild plum grows in thickets, along roadsides and borders of the woods. It is noted for beautifying our old fields and roadsides with white blossoms in early spring.

The Staghorn Sumac is a large-size, sprawling shrub or small tree, sometimes reaching a diameter of 10 inches. Like all the sumacs, it has compound leaves, which grow two feet long and turn a brilliant scarlet in autumn. The large leaves may have as many as 31 leaflets. This sumac can be told easily from the others, as its twigs are like the prongs of a deer covered with fine, velvet hairs. The branches of the staghorn sumac are coated with white hairs—its best distinguishing feature. This sumac blooms in May; the wood is soft and has a beautiful orange luster. The roots are yellowish-orange and were used in pioneer times to make dye. The branches have a thick pith and these are cut, the pith removed, and then they are used for spouts to draw off maple sap from trees at sugaring time. The Staghorn sumac produces red, fuzzy seed-pods, which furnish food to migrating birds and winter residents, too. There is no more glorious sight in October than the flaming glory of the staghorn sumac as it hides the drabness of the earth with a dazzling brilliance. The staghorn sumac is fine for planting for borders or as an ornamental.

The Smooth Sumac has smaller leaves than the staghorn; it also lacks the velvety hairs on the branches. It blooms in June and has greenish flowers. It also produces seed-pods with larger seeds than the others. The leaves and bark are rich in tannic acid and were used in pioneer days for tanning leather. A red dye was formerly made from the red seed-pods. The leaves turn bright-red in autumn and the clusters of seeds are scarlet. The seeds are covered with reddish hairs, rich in malate of lime, which gives them the sour taste. The seeds and bark are medicinal and have been successfully used as a gargle for sore throat. The smooth sumac is also called "Scarlet Sumac."

The Poison Sumac, fortunately, does not grow in the Tri-

McSurelys Say Blast Was Attempt on Lives

Lexington, Ky.—Mr. and Mrs. Allan McSurely have vowed to return to their dynamite-damaged Pikeville, Ky., home "as soon as we can obtain the means to protect ourselves."

First, however, they said they would file a complaint with the U. S. Attorney for Eastern Kentucky to ask an investigation of the dynamiting.

The McSureslys, who were indicted last year on a sedition charge while doing poverty work in Eastern Kentucky, were routed from their home about 1 a.m. December 13 by a dynamite blast.

It was definitely "an assassination attempt," they told a news conference later in the day, "and not an attempt to scare us or anything like that."

They noted that two sticks of dynamite were thrown at their bedroom window, missing it by about eight inches, by someone "who had cased the joint and knew where our bedroom was and what time we retired."

They charged the attempt was a part of a "conspiracy" in Pike county "to silence us forever—and our baby."

The McSureslys' son, a year old this month, was in the house at the time, but neither he nor his parents were injured.

McSurely, an employee of the Southern Conference Education Fund, said he would ask a federal probe of "the conspiracy in Pike county and the billion dollar coal field to deprive us of our constitutional rights."

"We don't expect anything to come out of this, however. Nothing came out of other complaints we filed with the FBI and the U. S. Attorney's office," he added.

McSurely and his wife, along with one other man, were arrested in August, 1967, in a raid by Pike county officials, who charged them with attempting to overthrow the government of the county violently.

That charge later was thrown out when a panel of three federal judges ruled Kentucky's sedition law, under which they had been charged, unconstitutional.

McSurely said Pikeville "is the center of an organized attempt to kill as many people as possible among those who refuse to leave the mountains."

He gave as examples deaths in mining disasters, sickness peculiar to the mining industry and said a greater percentage of mountain men are sent to Vietnam.

The mountain people, he added, know that violence is coming soon.


