

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

Why Not A Community Chest?

Floyd county is so beset by drives for this cause or another that, along about this time of year, every year, the most cheerful giver becomes just a bit saddle-sore.

All these causes are good. They deserve the full support of the public. The Scouting movement for both boys and girls is one of the most important contributions to the physical, moral and mental development and well-being of the nation's youth. The Red Cross, Christmas Seals, Easter Seals, American Cancer Society, National Foundation all these have made notable contributions to humanity facing adversity and suffering. (The reader will forgive us if we have missed one of these deserving groups, since the list is so long that it is difficult to recall them all.)

But the constant round of calls for support that is made annually becomes, before they are all Lended, an irritating thing to many, and even the goodwill of those who are willing to back them with their money is often sorely tried.

What this county needs is the Community Chest system of handling funds for all these organizations, or some similar method. Representatives of all these groups which depend upon public financial support should get together, now, and plan such a method for next year.

Thus the total financial needs of each would be the goal of the next drive. In this way, one call a year on each individual or firm would suffice. One pledge, or one check, would be made, and the contributor would not be harrassed by solicitors and calls for help over a period of several months.

We believe this change would effect a unity of effort, create better public relations for the participating organizations and, in the end, result in a greater total contribution by the public.

We should, everyone of us, in compassion for others and out of gratitude for our blessings, give generously during the individual drives now under way or yet to be launched soon. But, after that, we should all demand that these needs be pooled under one heading and this seemingly endless round of solicitation ended.
