Naturalist Workshop At Jenny Wiley Park To Continue 3 Days

The Kentucky Department of Parks announced this week that it will sponsor a field naturalist workshop, entitled "Ornithological (Bird) Weeyend" this week-end at Jenny Wiley State Park. The workshop will begin Friday and continue through Sunday.

Jim Butler, the state's chief

naturalist, said the workshop is scheduled at an opportune time to witness bird migration through Kentucky, in particular the migration of warblers. Donald J. Borror, Columbus,

Ohio, professor of zoology, Ohio State University, will be the featured speaker. He has completed extensive research in bioacoustics, the study of bird song.

Ann L. Stamm, editor of The Kentucky Warbler, will give a demonstration on the techniques of bird banding. Nets will be set in advance of the demonstration to capture migrant birds.

Many of the state's leading ornithologists will conduct field trips as part of the program.

Court Interference Rumors Are Denied

(This was the headline and what follows is the news item that appeared in The Floyd County Times on November 9, 1961.)

Here to vote Tuesday in his home precinct at Cliff, Governor Bert T. Combs expressed concern about rumors spread here to the effect that he had been instrumental in causing Dan Goble to lose the Democratic nomination for Jailer by Appellate Court decision.

"I have heard a lot of talk since I arrived here and even before," the Governor said, "that my political foes are saying I used my influence with the court to have Dan thrown out. Let me, first of all, say I could not have so influenced the court if I had wanted to-and, next, that I did not want to.

"Dan Goble has been my friend through all my political battles, and he perhaps has lost some friends because of his friendship for me. More than that, he has fought my battles without asking anything for himself—and that is, as you know, not always the case in politics. This boy has been my friend, and I would be most ungrateful if I did not appreciate him and what he has done for me.

"Dan has taken this blow like a man, and I say this on Election Day before the results are in: Whatever happens, I plan to find a job for him, if he will accept it, which he can do efficiently and without waste to the taxpayers of Kentucky. He has suffered disappointment, has been out a lot in court costs, and still he doesn't ask for anything but I intend to help him to that extent."



CIRCUIT JUDGE Suggests Reforms For the Circuit Court

It may be that our present Circuit Judge should be given credit in having made certain improvements in what may be called "The Dignity of The Court." However there are areas in the Administration of Justice which are equally - indeed, more important - to those involved in cases in the Circuit Court, I mention only two in this article and two others on another page in this paper:

1. Written Opinions On Major Decisions.

Present practice, generally, is for the judge to give his decision from the bench, directing the lawyer winning the case to prepare the written judgement. This often leaves the losing party with little explanation as to why the judge decided as he did. As Circuit Judge I will support all major decisions by a recorded or written opinion.

2. Speedy Action On Cases.

In only one week of campaigning, I am surprised by the number of people who complain of long delays in deciding their cases. However, the speedy movement of cases is the direct responsibility of the Circuit







More Reforms for Circuit Court Proposed by

Paul E. Hayes Circuit Judge

Here are two policies that should be adopted in the Circuit Court:

1. FACING SQUARELY THE ISSUES.

Sometimes elected, rather than appointed, Judges are tempted to step aside, especially when public questions become "hot potatoes," with large groups of voters on one side or the other. A special judge from out of the county must then be appointed. He cannot possibly know our problems as well as our own. In the opinion of many this happens far too often in Floyd county. As your Circuit Judge I will "face the music," not "pass the buck."

2. A WELL DEFINED POLICY OF PROBATION IN CRIMINAL CASES:

One of the more difficult problems of the Circuit Judge is whether or not to probate. A well defined probate policy should be established in our county based upon facts of the crime, past record, age, family, occupational prospects, and probability of criminal repeat. Certainly no Political considerations should be involved. Citizens I have talked

with complain that present probate practices have no rhyme or reason.

Rest assured if I am elected your Circuit Judge, I shall set up such a policy — and in writing.



Displaying superior skill and ingenumly, Captain Hayes devised certain innovations which subsequently proved highly beneficial, not only to his own unit, but also to adjacent and higher echelons. Captain Hayes' exceptional skill as an armament officer, his outstanding leadership, and his constant devotion to duty contributed directly to the safety of combat crews and to the percision of high attitude bombing, and as such reflect the highest credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States. Entered military service from Kentucky.



#### A LOOK AT THE CRIME RECORD IN KENTUCKY

There are those who would change Floyd from a "dry" to a "wet" county, and a certain percentage of these are sincere in the belief that legalizing sale of whiskey, beer and other intoxicants would

help rather than hurt the county.

How they can justify such thinking in the light of Floyd county's record - the record of years ago when this was a wet county as compared with the record as dry-we will never know. Murder, once the shame of a good people, has become a rarity in this county. Once a veritable "Dark and Bloody Ground," termed by one official "the bloodiest soil in the Western Hemisphere," Floyd county today has a murder rate that is among the lowest in Kentucky, and the county is singularly free of crimes of violence.

But the local scene does not pinpoint the relationship between legalized liquor and crime as eloquently, perhaps, as do the cold figures and purely objective statements recorded by the Kentucky Commission on Law-Enforcement and Crime Prevention in its recent official report, "Crime in Kentucky.'

We may skip Louisville and Lexington, Newport, Covington, Paducah and other "wet" cities and their appallingly high incidence of major crime. Instead, consider these two instances of a "wet" city and another which is "dry" - wet Bowling Green and dry Ashland.

Ashland, which embraces 1% of the state's total population, had in 1967, the year on which the Commission completed its study and made its report, only .8 of 1 percent of the major crime in Ken-

tucky. Said the Crime Report: "Reported crime in Ashland is the lowest of all first and second class cities in Kentucky and is somewhat under the average for cities of its size across the country . . ."

For the year under study Ashland had not one murder, not one rape.

Now to Bowling Green, quoting the same official report:

"Reported crime in Bowling Green in 1967 was 47% higher than the average for cities of its size across the country. Its rate for all seven . . . offenses except robbery was higher than that for other cities of comparable size, with homicide, aggravated assaults and major larcenies being significantly greater."

Bowling Green's crime rate per 100,000 population included 11.1 homicides as compared with 3.5 for other cities its size.

Why the difference with these two cities? Let the official report of the Commission answer:

"There are several factors to which the low incidence of major crime in Ashland may possibly be attributed . . . . Ashland is a dry community. As a result, drunkenness and related offenses account for a relatively low percentage of total arrests. While slightly more than 36% of the total arrests in the state were for drunken offenses . . . Ashland reported only 27%."

"Bowling Green is surrounded by dry counties. One sergeant from the Bowling Green department suggested that the high incidence of violent crimes may be partly attributed to the fact that Bowling Green is the only 'wet' oasis on the route from Nashville to Louisville. As indicated by the Wolfgang and Shupe studies, there is apparent correlation between alcohol and violent crimes."

And those who say they truly want a better Floyd county and solemnly declare their concern for their county, argue that beer and liquor, plenty of legalized beer and liquor, will wash all our troubles away! Those who are sincere in their desire to help Floyd county should now get an antidote to that brainwashing they've had.

There are those who will cite neighboring Magoffin as a "dry" county where the incidence of crime is abnormally high. But an honest, earnest effort at enforcing the law is necessary for Magoffin or any other county to earn for the law that respect that results in order rather than disorder.

Not all is perfect in Floyd county, but there is a respect for the law and there is an absence of major crime that should please every citizen who wants to live at peace with his neighbor. To change this makes as much sense as some of the other changes that have been made in the morals and thinking that now plague this land of ours.

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ORDINANCE NO. 2-69

An Ordinance of The City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, providing for the assessment of Real and Personal Property and for the levy of a general property tax at the rate of Thirty Cents (30c) per each One Hundred Dollar \$100.00) valuation of Real and Personal Property located within the corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, on January 1st, for 1969, and a further levy of Poll Tax of One Dollar and Fifty Cents (\$1.50) on each male person over the age of 21 years and under the age of 65 years residing within the corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, on January 1st, 1969, with certain statutory exemptions.

NOW, THEREFIRE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF PRESTONS-BURG, KENTUCKY, AS FOL-LOWS:

SECTION 1. A tax is hereby evied upon all property, both real and personal, having a tax itus in the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as of January 1969, for general purposes, inunder shall be paid to the City April 25, 1967: Freasurer of Prestonsburg and claced in the credit of a general levied as follows:

A. The sum of thirty cents real and pensonal property located within the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as of Jan-

B. A poll tax of \$1.50 on each male person over the age of 21 rears and under the age of 65 years, residing within the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, on January 1, 1969, excepting those persons exempt from tax under

KRS 92.300(3) and KRS 142.020. SECTION 2. The property taxes and poll taxes for the year 1969 shall become due and payable on October 1, 1969, by which date tax notices shall have been mailed each taxpayer, and all axes paid prior to November , 1969, shall be allowed a discount of 2%; all property and poll taxes for the year 1969 becoming due and payable on Norember 1, 1969.

SECTION 3. All taxpayers who do not pay the tax herein levied prior to January 1, 1970, shall be required to pay a pendty of 6% of the amount of the bax in addition to the tax levied

SECTION 4. All taxpayers who do not pay the tax herein levied on or before the 1st day of April, 1970, shall be required to pay a penalty of 25% of the amount of the tax in adition to the tax levied herein.

SECTION 5 The Delinquent Tax Collector is hereby authorized to adventise for sale in a newspaper having a general circulation in Floyd County, Kentucky, all dellinquent taxes on real property placed in his hands for collection and the charge for such advertising shall be added to the amount of the tax bill.

SECTION 6. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, and this Ordinance shall take effect as of the date of adoption and publication as required by

SECTION 7. The provisions of this Ordinance are separable, and if any of the provisions or penalties provided herein shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent urisdiction, such decsion of the court will not affect or impair any other section, clause, provision or portion of the Ordinance which is not in itself invalid or unconstitutional. The City further covenants that the Current Expenses incurred in any year shall not exceed the necessary and reasonable amounts required therefor, and that the City will not expend any amount or incur any obligations for operation, maintenance and repair in excess of the amounts provided for Current Expenses in the current Annual Budget, except on proper justification and resolution by the governing body of the City, that such expenditures are necessary to operate and maintain the project. The City further covenants that at the same time and in like manner, the City shall prepare an estimate of Gross Revenues to be derived from the operation of the project for said fiscal year and that sufficient Gross Revenues shall be provided, through the maintenance of proper rates and changes (and through the increase thereof if necessary) to satisfy the requirements of all the provisions contained in this Ordinance, including the accumuation and maintenance of all required reserves specified herein.

SECTION 15. SEPARATE ACCOUNT-ING OF WATER AND SEWER REVENUES.


