Council Views Varied Plans, No Solution

Prestonsburg merchants asked the city council Monday to help them unravel the downtown traffic tangle but some council members feared that a solution proposed by the merchants would only compound the problem.

Hansel Cooley, vice-president of the Prestonsburg Business Association, acknowledged that reversing traffic on Arnold Avenue in order to bring shoppers into the downtown business district from US 23—a change effected several weeks ago by the city council at the merchants' urging—has caused headaches for motorists looking for a way out of the city.

To resolve the problem, the merchants' group proposed that traffic flow in two directions on Arnold Avenue, between Court and Graham, and also on Court Street, between Arnold Avenue and Lake Drive. Parking could be eliminated from that section of Court Street, Cooley explained.

But Councilman Estill Lee Carter, who said he was apprehensive from the start about tinkering with Arnold Avenue traffic, urged his colleagues to be wary of making further changes.

One aspect of the merchants' plan that would need to be investigated, Carter said, was whether tractor trailers would be able to make turns from Court Street onto Lake Drive.

Among other proposals for dealing with the city's traffic snarl, Councilman Bill Ray Collins suggested that parking be banned on Arnold Avenue and that the street be designated two-way over its entire length.

Clyde Burchett suggested the same for Court Street. Shoppers would not miss the parking spaces because "no one parks there now but (store) clerks," the Court Street jeweler argued.

Whatever the city decides, it should enforce its laws, said Garland Godsey. Traffic has been flowing unhindered in two directions on Arnold Avenue ever since traffic flow was reversed there, he said.

However, Mayor Harold Cooley said city police have filled three books with citations of motorists driving the wrong way there and the volume of citations has drawn comment from the district judge.

The council deferred action on the various proposals, pending further study.

City Attorney Paul P. Burchett will be asked to study the city's legal options in view of the fact that votes were cast last week in opposition to the city's plans to annex tracts on Katy Friend and at Lancer. Since the areas to be annexed included no residents, no one was eligible to vote on the question, City Manager David Evans contended.

Bowman Is Given Year's Sentence On Drug Charge

State police simply picked up the wrong man, the defense attorney argued. But the undercover agent who said Danny Bowman sold him drugs at a Middle Creek residence three years ago swore he had no doubts about the identification.

A Floyd circuit court jury wrestled with that conflict for more than three hours Monday, before finding the defendant guilty. It recommended a one-year jail term, the minimum provided by law.

State Trooper Nelson O'Donnell, who was working as an undercover narcotics agent at the time, said he was led by an informant in June, 1980, to a house rented by Bowman on KY 114 at the mouth of Spurlock. He paid \$5 for two Quaaludes and \$75 for just less than a gram of PCP, O'Donnell said.

Bowman, a coal truck driver who now lives in Williamson, West Virginia, denied the charge. If O'Donnell bought drugs there, he must not have been home at the time, Bowman said. Friends often stayed in the house when he was out, he said.

Defense Attorney Gary Johnson said yesterday (Tuesday) he will seek a new trial and, failing that, will appeal Monday's verdict. By dwelling in his closing argument on the harmful effects of drug abuse on the community and urging more cooperation between the public and police, Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Albert A. Burchett had clouded for jurors the issue of whether his

Jones Case Is Closed To Public

Pre-trial arguments in two federal cases involving Prestonsburg businessmen advanced this week, one of them under a veil of court-ordered secrecy.

In Pikeville, U.S. District Judge G. Wix Unthank heard preliminary motions Monday in the trial of coal operator Edgar Jones and 19 others accused of plotting to force a rival coal company out of business.

In Lexington, meanwhile, prosecutors argued they should not have to prove the state lost money as the result of an insurance-commission scheme allegedly involving Charles J. McNally and former state Cabinet secretary James E. Gray.

Jones, who is president of the JRM Coal Company, was named in federal grand jury indictments last June—along with contract miners who worked for him and officials of the union local to which they belonged—on charges stemming from incidents which occurred early last year at the Ray-Mac mine on John Hall Branch, near McDowell.

Incidents reported at the time included the burning of a Ray-Mac tipple, the destruction of mining equipment by dynamite, and coal trucks being fired on. Jones and the others are accused of planning to shut Ray-Mac down by violence and extortion.

On a motion of defense attorneys, Judge Unthank closed Monday's hearing to the public and the press. Citing the judge's order, a federal prosecutor refused to answer a reporter's questions about the hearing.

Court officials insisted that Unthank's

Dinco Decision May Prove Landmark Case

The question of whether a Dinwood coal tipple is subject to regulation under federal stripmining laws is scheduled to be argued today (Wednesday) before the U.S. Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals.

The outcome of a similar case, involving a West Prestonsburg tipple, will likely be determined by the Dinwood decision. And the case could have implications for dozens of other communities across the state.

At issue is the question of whether the crushing and loading facility operated by Dinco Coal Sales at Dinwood, just south of Martin, is a "surface coal mining operation" within the meaning of the 1977 Surface Mining Control and Reclamation Act.

Many Dinwood residents are hoping that it is. For, according to the Act, no such operation can be set up within 300 feet of where people live unless all the people give the operator written permission. Some who live in the shadow of the Dinco tipple have never signed waivers and they are not about to.

McIntire Risner, who lives only 35 feet from the Dinco weigh station, is a black lung victim. Everett Hunter, not 250 feet away, has TB. Mary Moore is elderly, has a serious lung problem, and often needs to use a portable breathing machine. She lives about 175 feet from the tipple. Mary and Ivan Debord, who live 225 feet away, both have disabling lung diseases.

They are among 16 Dinwood residents who complained in 1981 of noise and dust generated by the tipple and saw the operation shut down by a federal mining inspector.

Local Job Corps Director Resigns

Thomas E. Hummer has resigned as director of the Prestonsburg Job Corps Center, effective December 1. He has received an offer of a better-paying job, he said this week.

Hummer came under fire last month from critics who complained of lax discipline at the center. But his decision to move on is a personal career choice and has nothing to do with the criticism, he said.

Ironically, low salaries figured among last month's complaints, one critic charging that the pay scale at the Prestonsburg center is the lowest of any Job Corps center in the nation. Hummer, who reportedly earned \$22,500 as center director, defended the pay scale at the time, arguing that wages paid center staffers were comparable to those paid for similar work in this area.

Charles Alexander, fired as the center's deputy director last March, named Hummer and other Job Corps officials as defendants in a \$793,500 damage suit in October. At the same time, former Prestonsburg city council member Tom Rose criticized Hummer's management of the center in a letter to Congressman Carl D. Perkins. Both men argued that the center needed firmer leadership and stricter discipline.

Hummer, who lives at Van Lear, declined to identify his future employer but said he will be remaining in this area.

Clerk Cries Foul At Work Backlog

Her clerks and members of the public are suffering as a result of the volume of work left behind by her predecessor, newly-elected County Clerk Carla R. Boyd charged this week.

But former Clerk Thomas D. Lafferty, Jr., dismissed the complaint as "a retaliatory gesture" and said Mrs. Boyd's problems are minor compared to those he inherited from her uncle, the late C. Ollie Robinson, earlier this year.

In a paid advertisement in The Times, Mrs. Boyd offered caustic "thanks" to Lafferty and his staff "for the efficiency of the way they handled the clerk's office." The new clerk replaced all but

two members of the former clerk's staff.

Mrs. Boyd said she had been left a large box of unopened mail, dating to the beginning of September, and more than 200 deeds and mortgages for which Lafferty had accepted payment but which he had never recorded. Stacks of auto license receipts are lying about the clerk's office, unfiled, and many other documents have so far gone unrecorded, she said.

"They collected the money, but they have done no work. Now we have to do the work he was paid for," the new clerk said. "I was expecting a mess, but

Official Results Show Vote 4 to 1 Democratic in County

Official results of last week's elections show Democratic candidates for state office outpolling Republicans by better than four to one in Floyd county. The governor's race was somewhat less lopsided, with Floyd voters choosing Martha Layne Collins over Jim Bunning by more than two to one.

Only in the judge-executive's race did a Republican candidate make a good showing and, even there, Democrat John M. Stumbo, with 7828, held a 2445-vote lead over Ronald Frasure.

State Republican candidates won none but a single precinct here—surprisingly,

the Tickey (Grethel) returns credit Eugene P. Stewart with 72 votes and Steven L. Beshear with only 32 in the lieutenant-governor's race—with Democrats winning by more than 10 votes to one in precincts like Garrett and Head of Mud.

Even at Tickey, where GOP sentiment runs relatively high, Democrats outvoted Republicans by almost two to one in all state races except that for lieutenant-governor.

In the judge's race, Frasure carried 15 precincts—12 of them in the first magisterial district—compared to 32 for

Stumbo. In the first district, Stumbo carried only Porter 2, Depot (West Prestonsburg), Auxier, Cow Creek, Buffalo and Allen-Dwale. Outside of the first district, Frasure carried only Maytown, Lackey and Branham's Creek.

One Auxier citizen gave Barkley Sturgill a write-in vote for judge-executive.

Carla Boyd did not concede a single precinct in her landslide victory over Evelyn Goble and Elmer Ferguson in the county clerk's race. Dan Jack Combs won every Floyd precinct except Rock Fork in his successful bid for the state appeals court.

At Allen, the only four candidates—Vernon Porter, with 67 votes, Willard Adkins, 58, Eugene Jarrell and Bonnie Lafferty, each 52—were automatically elected to the city council. At Wayland, Bonnie Clark, 97 votes, Ralph Stephen Banks, 94, Linda Webb, 92, and Sam Fraley, 49, were elected city commissioners. Other candidates there were Dan Juett, 44, Mack Stewart, 42, and Mike Froman, 41.

At Wheelwright, three of those elected to council—Freddie Johnson, 60 votes, Elvie Wenk, 48, and B. J. Mead, 47—were write-ins. Truman Smith, the only candidate listed on the ballot, received 44 votes to become the fourth council member.

Votes were recorded for 22 write-in candidates in the Lee Hall (Wheelwright) precinct. The others were: Jerry Tackett, 30, Robert Jackson, 9, Dennis Holbrook, 4, Robert Hood, 2, and one each for Sarah Hood, Cleo Trimble, Bro Jack, Jerry Hamby, Russell Isaac, Bill Tackett, Joe Minix, Reba Smallwood, Freddie Tackett, Truman Tackett, Alfred Rhea, Ralph Caudill, Beva Johnson, Joe Stewart, and Clark Thornsbury.

Although First District Constable Linzie Hale had no opposition, he complained that his name was left off the ballot in the ten precincts where his total is listed as zero.

The recording of 27 West Prestonsburg and three Lancer votes in opposition to annexation by Prestonsburg has city officials puzzled. While a section on Katy Friend and several businesses at Lancer are scheduled for annexation, the city is not aware that either parcel affects resident voters, Mayor Harold Cooley said after the election. Only residents of the area affected are entitled to vote on an annexation question.

He will refer the matter to the Board of Election Commissioners, Cooley said. Auxier road residents are scheduled to vote on annexation next May.

The program is designed to help pupils develop skills in ordering, receiving, stocking, and inventory of merchandise. ty, is about 25 miles from the tippie. In September last year, U.S. District Judge G. Wix Unthank rejected that argument, ruling in favor of the residents. Federal inspectors have jurisdiction over crushing and loading facilities regardless of the distance between tippie and mine, he decided.

It is that decision which has been appealed, both by the coal operator and the Office of Surface Mining, and will be heard today by three judges of the federal appeals court in Cincinnati.

Hanging on the decision will be the fate not only of the Dinwood operation but also that of a Middle Creek tippie operated by Paul W. and Paul Hunt Thompson.

In that case, William C. Allen, Edgar Fitzpatrick, Arvil Jack Gibson and Joan Gibson, who live out of West Prestonsburg on the old Middle Creek road, argue that the tippie built there by C.J. McNally and Company in 1980 is operating in violation of the law because none of the residents living nearby have given the operator permission.

In September, when the case was scheduled to be tried in U.S. District Court, Judge Unthank held it in abeyance, pending this week's trial of the Dinwood case.

Both state and federal mining authorities have denied responsibility for the West Prestonsburg tippie, on grounds that it is not operated in connection with a surface coal mining operation. The tippie is about 20 miles from the nearest mine from which it receives coal.

But residents have argued that the 1977 Surface Mining Act was intended by Congress to extend to all coal preparation and processing facilities.

Tippie owner Paul Hunt Thompson argued recently that he and his father have invested \$515,397 in the plant on the basis of assurances by state mining authorities that it met all legal requirements and was not subject to regulation by state or federal mining agencies.

Moreover, site preparation for the plant was begun in 1976, a year before the federal Act was passed, Thompson notes.

In pressing for an immediate decision in the West Prestonsburg case, Steven Sanders—an attorney with the Appalachian Research and Defense Fund (ARDF), who is representing some of the residents there—argued that the legal issues in that case differ somewhat from the Dinwood case. But Judge Unthank held that the central issues are common to both cases.

Other ARDF attorneys, David Rubinstein and Thomas J. Fitzgerald, and Robert Jordan, an Inez lawyer, will be arguing for residents in the Dinwood case. Dinco Coal Sales is represented by David Short and William H. Gorin, of the Frankfort law firm of Stites, McElwain and Fowler; and OSM by Charles P. Gault, of that agency's field solicitor's office.

client was "the right man," Johnson claimed.

The defense lawyer noted during the trial that O'Donnell, who had been brought from Richmond to conduct a drug investigation here, had met his client only briefly and described him in his report of the alleged drug deal as having blue eyes. Bowman has green eyes.

Johnson also questioned the reliability of the informant and other aspects of the narcotics agent's testimony. The informant, a Pike county man who was himself facing a drug trafficking charge, was anxious to please police but had nothing to gain by telling the truth and had initially identified Bowman, erroneously, as Danny Bowens, the attorney noted.

Arlen Calhoun, 52, owner of the house Bowman rented, and his son, Tim, 24, both testified that Bowman had a good reputation and supported his claim that friends sometimes stayed at the house in his absence.

Within days of the alleged drug transaction, a state law took effect which raised trafficking in PCP from a Class D to a Class C felony and substantially increased the penalty. Since July 1, 1980, conviction carries a five-to-ten year jail term; prior to that time the penalty ranged from one to five years.

Because the sale of which he was convicted took place on June 27, 1980, Bowman was subject only to the earlier, lighter penalty. Moreover, although he was convicted of selling two drugs, he was indicted on a single trafficking charge.

Circuit Judge Hollie Conley released him under a \$20,000 bond pending a sentencing hearing, December 2.

'The End of Time'

An article by Dr. Carl Sagan in Parade Magazine, October 30, 1983, titled, "The Nuclear Winter," gives us a good idea of what it will be like at the end of time. Too many of the great minds of the world agree, it will happen. Dr. Sagan tells us it will only take about one percent of the 50,000 nuclear war heads of the U.S.S.R. and the U.S.A. to bring on the nuclear winter.

These two countries are so powerful in nuclear war development that no other is mentioned in Dr. Sagan's report. Yet, these two countries are but one eighth of the world's population. Both countries are working to build more nuclear war heads and fighting over where to put them. It doesn't really matter where they put them.

The four stages of destruction of the world according to Dr. Sagan are:

1. When the bombs are exploded, large balls of fire will roll over cities and country side. This will kill 1.1 billion people. What saints will go rushing in to pick up the bodies? Where will be the doctors and ambulances? What hospitals will there be? None. Our civilization will be reduced to a level of prehistoric times.

2. A nuclear cloud of radioactive dust and soot will cover the surface of a dying planet. It will block out the sun and bring darkness over the land, covering more than a billion bodies that are beginning to decay.

3. The planet will cool far below freezing and will last for several months or perhaps years. All oxygen-producing plant life as well as animal life, domestic and wild, will be destroyed. Radioactive clouds will sweep across the dark planet, killing anything that might have escaped stages one and two.

4. In a few weeks, the radioactive nuclear clouds will rise and deplete the ozone layer and let in solar ultraviolet light that will burn the face of the planet. The Earth will be like hundreds of millions other planets we know about. Great winds of radioactive clouds will blow over the dead planet. There are many signs on Mars and other planets that perhaps life did exist there also.

I wonder if perhaps we are a little block in God's big plan of dominoes; that, a trillion years ago, other planets followed the same course we are now in and can't seem to do anything about.

Why do I believe it will happen? Too many great minds believe it will. On TV Conference via satellite from Moscow, Washington and New York, Dr. Teller, the father of the bomb, Carl Sagan, Russia's leading scientist, and several other men of science talked about Sagan's article. They were in agreement; it will happen. To me, the Russians are more concerned than are the Americans, so it seems.

Our President has talked about a limited nuclear war. He has said we could win it. Only a fool or a madman could believe such a thing. Reportedly, a computer error started a countdown that would have fired the American bombs. It went two thirds of the way before the error was detected. Moscow and Washington are positioning for advantage, just in case.

After my grandson's birthday party, I sat at the kitchen table and listened while seven or eight engineers, most of whom have a master's in engineering, talked of the prospects of a nuclear war and what can be done about it or to prevent it.

These brilliant young men said they knew how, if only the government would put up the trillion dollars, to tie Russia in a knot before she could get off a shot. They seemed so certain this was the solution. Mind you, I believe they are smarter than most, if not all, people in government. They would place a platform just beyond the ozone layer, punch a hole, or place a funnel, through the ozone layer and zero a laser over Russia and all it's friends who might have a missile. I thought it was a sure way to destroy the earth. It doesn't matter where the bombs are exploded.

Our government has spent more time and money on peace conferences, trying to reduce the number of bombs or missiles than they did in building their own bombs. Like the engineers' plan with the laser, it only serves a false hope. It doesn't matter how many bombs or missiles we or the Russians have—it's how many megatons they are. We could agree to throw away a hundred and build one to replace it that would be more powerful than two hundred like the one we destroy. Another reason for false security. It seems to me the work of ignorant people.

What can we all do? A little, maybe. If you haven't already, write a letter to U.S. President Ronald Reagan and Soviet President Yuri Andropov, send them both in care of Parade Magazine, P.O. Box 4281, Grand Central Station, New York, N.Y. 10163. Parade will see to it that they are delivered to the proper place in Moscow and Washington. I've already written mine.

Breaking of Smoke Habit Goal of State Agency In Health Promotion


The Cabinet for Human Resources is encouraging many Frankfort state employees to take a day off—a day off from smoking—on Nov. 17.

The cabinet's Department for Health Services is promoting state government's participation in the Great American Smokeout, a national campaign launched by the American Cancer Society. The organization promotes the annual event as a special day for cigarette smokers to prove to themselves they can quit smoking.

Kentucky's health commissioner, Dr. David T. Allen, says state government's observance will offer "moral support" to employees who want to break the smoking habit.

"The objective is to encourage and help people do without their cigarettes for a full 24 hours," said Allen. "We are taking a light, good-natured approach to a serious subject. The participating agencies have planned special events to focus attention on ways to stop smoking."

Drought Hurts Ginseng Crop

As the harvest season for ginseng comes to an end, state Department of Agriculture inspectors are finding yet another Kentucky crop which has been affected by this summer's drought.

"Ginseng needs a normal amount of rain to produce heavy, valuable roots," said state Agriculture Commissioner Alben W. Barkley II. "Like our bigger cash crops, ginseng didn't get the water it needed. Our records indicate not as many pounds of the root may be harvested this year, and that will have an impact on this \$5 million industry." Last year under good growing conditions, more than 18,000 pounds of ginseng were produced in the state.

"So far this digging season, our inspectors have certified only 2,721 pounds of the root in 75 counties," Barkley said. "This is down considerably from last year, but we won't know how badly the heat affected the crop until the end of the buying season next March."

Kentucky is the world's largest producer of wild ginseng. It grows wild in 106 of the state's 120 counties.

Highly prized in the Orient for its medical properties, wild ginseng is bringing close to \$120 per pound. Cultivated ginseng, which is produced in small quantities in the state, brings about half that price.

As the result of a 1982 state law, ginseng dealers must be registered with the Agriculture Department and must keep records of the ginseng they buy and sell. Ginseng must be certified by the department before it enters the foreign trade market.

Ginseng can be harvested in Kentucky from August 15 until November 30. The roots can be bought and sold from August 15 through next March.

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
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

Tax Hearings Slated Locally November 22

The Kentucky Unmined Minerals Tax Advisory Commission will conduct public hearings Tuesday, November 22, in Prestonsburg and Madisonville, Commission Chairman and Revenue Secretary Ron Geary announced today.

The Prestonsburg hearing is scheduled for 10 a.m. to noon in the Pike Technology Building, Prestonsburg Community College.

The Madisonville hearing will be 2:30 p.m. to 5 p.m. (CST) in the Madisonville Community College Auditorium.

Geary said that anyone with information or opinions regarding any aspect of taxing unmined minerals in Kentucky is invited to speak at the public hearings.

The commission was appointed this fall by Governor John Y. Brown Jr. to study the taxation of unmined deposits of coal, limestone and other minerals in Kentucky. In previous meetings the commission has heard testimony from representatives of other states which tax unmined minerals and from representatives of Kentucky state agencies which have expertise in coal valuation and economics.

Statistical Summary On Floyd Co. Vets

Floyd County has a total of 4,320 veterans, of whom 3,530 are persons who have served during a war-time period, according to the Veterans Administration.

The latest statistics show that 1,330 served in Vietnam Era, and of these 1,270 had no service in Korea. There are 680 Korean Conflict veterans, and of these 600 did not see service in World War II.

The largest group of veterans is from World War II. They number 1,620. There are still 50 veterans from World War I.

Since the ending of the Vietnam War 250 persons from Floyd County have served in the armed forces and have been discharged. There are an additional 430 persons who were in service between the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam Era. Others who served in previous periods of peace-time number 120.

Over one-fourth of all Vietnam Era veterans served in the combat area during the almost 11-year war.

In Kentucky there are approximately 405,000 veterans of whom 333,000 served in time of war. There are 117,000 Vietnam Era veterans; 73,000 Korean Conflict veterans; 157,000 World War II veterans, and 5,000 World War I veterans. There have been 22,000 persons who have been in service since the end of the Vietnam Era, and 43,000 ex-servicemen who served between Vietnam and Korea. There are 7,000 others who served in different peace-time eras.

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Child Fund Finances Lost Child Campaign

Since the inception of Child Care, a national non-profit clearinghouse for locating missing children, 567 children have been returned to their homes, according to Peggy Rector, of Martin.

Rector reports that more than 2 million children are listed as missing each year in the United States, results of runaways or abduction.

Child Care has established a registry of missing children. Parents pay an annual fee of \$60 to have their missing child included in this registry, which is available to law enforcement officers, private investigators, schools, and other institutions. Child Find (Box 277, New Paltz, NY 12561) maintains a toll free hotline, 1-800-431-5005, exclusively for the missing children, or 1-914-255-1848, for other calls.

Child Find is offering a Child Finder Kit, which includes preventive information for parents and youngsters as well as details on how to preregister a child with the organization.

Volunteers Are Needed For Tax-Aide Program

The AARP District Coordinator for the Tax-Aide Program and the I.R.S. Taxpayer Education Coordinator are recruiting volunteers to serve as tax counselors to older persons during the 1984 tax season.

Tax Counseling for the Elderly is a community service of the American Association of Retired Persons working in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service. It provides free income tax help to older taxpayers in preparing their state and federal returns.

Volunteers are needed who have a sincere interest in serving older adults and have been preparing their own returns for several years. They should be willing to participate in an Internal Revenue Service training course to be held in various parts of the state during December and early January, 1984. Also, they must agree to devote at least four hours a week, during the tax season, providing tax counseling for the elderly, low-income, handicapped and home-bound persons.

Volunteers do not have to be members of any organization, but they should be older persons since a unique feature of the program is emphasis on peer group assistance. However, persons of any age are welcome.

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Large Companies Profit Despite Coal Sales Slump

1982 was a bad year for the Kentucky coal economy.

That is a generally accepted reality. Most coalfield families, if not directly affected by a mine layoff or shutdown, know of neighbors who were. Unemployment in coal mining communities ran well above state and national averages. And coal county governments, heavily dependent upon coal severance tax revenues, saw road programs and other services suffer as those revenues failed to materialize.

The effects of the 1982 coal slump, which has continued through much of 1983, are well known to the public. But what is not so generally well known is how the slump has impacted the non-production activities of coal companies and mineral owners, such as their investment practices, applications for new permits, and profit levels.

Of major concern to coalfield residents is the well-being of the small, generally local, operator. A coal slump, particularly one in which spot market coal purchases are down, usually impacts small operators first and most heavily.

But an analysis of figures recently released by the Kentucky Department for Mines and Minerals reveals a slight surprise. Although most are not prospering, small operators are at least surviving. And despite the fact that production was down about six million tons in 1982 from the previous year, there were ac-

tually more companies mining that coal than in 1981!

Another surprise comes in a look at the permitting activities for coal mines in 1982. In that year, there were more applications for new mining permits than there had been in any recent year. According to the Kentucky Department of Energy, 1,738 mining applications were submitted in 1982. This compares with 1,372 in 1981 and 1,185 applications in 1980.

The increased number of permits accounts for a corresponding increase in the number of acres permitted for mining last year. The Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet reports that permission was granted for the disturbance of 70,000 acres for surface mines and 5,505 acres for underground mines and preparation plants. These figures represent a significant increase over the 49,879 acres and 2,353 acres permitted in 1981 for surface and underground mines, respectively, in 1981.

A better understanding of the shape of the coal industry is revealed in a closer look at two of the state's top coal producers—Peabody Coal Company and Pyro Mining Company.

Peabody Coal is a subsidiary of Peabody Holding Company which was formed in 1977 by Newmont Mining, Bethel Corp., Boeing Co., Equitable Life, and the Williams Co. The company is the state's and the nation's largest coal producer, mining nearly 15 million tons of Kentucky coal in 1982.

Peabody's 1982 Annual Report and the 10-K report for Newmont Mining show that 1982 was a good year for Peabody. Revenues increased by over 14 percent from 1981, with net income up by 61 percent, from \$62,727,000 in 1981 to \$101,177,000 in 1982.

Some of Peabody's increased revenues result from a nearly million ton increase in their Kentucky coal production over 1981 totals. Yet this production level was achieved despite the fact that the company employed about 900 fewer miners during the year, revealing that unemployment in the coal fields is the result of much more than simply a slumping market.

Peabody Coal layoffs have continued into 1983.

A depressed coal economy has not showed Peabody's investment practices. In 1982, according to the company's annual report, the value of "coal lands" increased by nearly \$11.4 million. And just recently, Peabody announced its intention to purchase 14 West Virginia coal mines and a coal terminal in Virginia from Armco.

Similar patterns can be found with Pyro Mining Company which produced about 2.5 million tons of Kentucky coal in 1982 in conjunction with a wholly owned subsidiary of the Costain Group Ltd., a large international engineering and mining firm based in London, England.

Pyro revenue for the first six months of 1983 increase by six percent to \$44,557,000. Operating income during this same period increased by 105 percent to \$5,089,000. The company has allocated \$16 million for the expansion of coal, oil and gas operations, "all of which is expected to be financed by cash flow from operations."

Pyro also made major investments in 1982, namely "the No. 9 seam... part of a potential 100 million recoverable tons of reserves acquired during the year from Alcoa," according to their annual report. Most of the company's 1983 production is coming from these reserves which is providing Pyro with higher productivity levels but fewer miners with jobs.

Both Peabody and Pyro cite their long-term supply agreements with at least annual price adjustment provisions as being one of the primary factors in keeping them insulated from the coal market slump that has seriously impacted coal mining communities and put thousands of miners out of work.

Trip on Mississippi To Aid Coal Study

In a style reminiscent of Huck Finn's travels, two Western Kentucky University chemistry professors plan to take a trip down the Mississippi River next summer looking for trouble.

A big difference, however, is that Dr. Norman Holy and Dr. John Riley have the backing of an \$88,000 U.S. Department of Transportation grant, the U.S. Coast Guard and WKU, to ride for nearly three weeks on a barge loaded with hot coal down to market in New Orleans.

It won't be exactly a pleasure cruise, however, for they'll be riding cargo that likely will be "hot coal" before it reaches its destination.

The two are going to study first-hand the problem of spontaneous heating that has plagued coal shippers for more than 100 years.

"Hot coal" is a term used to describe the tendency of some coals to undergo spontaneous heating when exposed to certain conditions, and hot coal is likely to develop when temperatures and humidities are high.

Currently there's no effective method of preventing spontaneous heating, and the problem is so serious that the National Coal Association and the Coal Exporters Association in 1981 formed a task group on coal handling, storage and transportation, and The American Society for Testing and Materials has two groups studying the problem.

But nobody's volunteered to ride a load of hot coal just to see what really happens along the way.

That's why the Dept. of Transportation took note of WKU's proposal, which in turn caught the interest of the Coast Guard which is dealing with the problem on the high seas.

Holy and Riley have done extensive research in coal, which is a major focus of WKU's chemistry department's research efforts. In the last eight years, WKU has had 23 grants totaling more than \$662,000 for coal research.

Some coals are more susceptible to the problem of spontaneous heating than others, and choosing the Mississippi River project was done because a vast majority of the coal delivered to New Orleans is shipped by barge—14,000,000 tons of it in 1981.

Most of the coal shipped to New Orleans is Illinois Basin Coal from Kentucky, Illinois, Indiana and Ohio.

The two researchers are currently collecting information from cooperating shippers and producers who have experienced problems in the past five years.

"We're asking them to send us all the appropriate information about coal analyses, dates, temperatures, seam identity, and any means of protection they use during barging," Holy says.

"All of this will be coded to protect the identity of the producers and shippers," he says.

Then the 17-day trip next summer will be an actual experience, and the two will monitor temperatures on a selected barge, assisted by two graduate students and three undergraduate chemistry students.

The final step in the research is to set up a data bank so WKU can make reliable recommendations for barging coal, and the two eventually plan to study coal shipping in other regions of the country, "so predictors can also be determined for their type of coal," Holy says.

"The biggest benefits will be to the coal producers because they'll be able to protect their coal so it can arrive safely under required standards at its destination, and help them avoid fines," says Riley.

"The export business may become more attractive and profitable for other coal producers," he added.

Dr. William G. Lloyd, dean of WKU's Ogden College of Science, Technology and Health, says the research will benefit Kentucky's economy directly since coal is the state's major natural resource.

WKU's chemistry department has four major external grants in coal right now, the largest number of any department at present.

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FLOSSING AND GUMS

Q. People who have just started flossing often find that gums may bleed from it. Is this a problem?

A. Probably not. Gums invariably bleed a bit when people begin the flossing ritual. Consistent bleeding will probably stop after a number of days, and you'll notice that the gums become pinker and firmer. Those who start flossing are often a bit too quick in bringing the floss to the gumline, snapping it too hard against the sensitive tissues. This causes the bleeding. In time, gums toughen and thrive on the stimulation, and the person's technique improves.

Flossing accomplishes two important things; it scrapes plaque from tooth surfaces, especially areas between teeth and sides of teeth. It also massages and stimulates the gums. But even after many years of flossing, gums will occasionally bleed from it.

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D.A.V., Chapter 18, Observes Veterans' Day



Veterans' Day was marked here by a memorial service conducted at Archer Park by the Andy J. Blanton, Chapter 18, Disabled American Veterans, of Auxier. Chaplain Lindsey Childers opened the program with prayer, and following the call to and posting of the colors, a wreath was placed at the foot of the war memorial and plaque containing the names of Floyd county's war dead. The wreath was put in place by Commander Millard Hughes, Jr., and Commander Mary Grace Johnson, Unit 18 Auxillary. Commander Hughes spoke briefly and a short musical program was presented on tape by Wade Moore. The ceremony was concluded with an impressive 21-gun salute and the playing of Taps.

P-burg Policeman Accidentally Shot

Kenneth W. Crisp, 24-year-old Prestonsburg police officer, was said to be recovering from a bullet wound to the foot which resulted when the gun of a fellow officer accidentally discharged, Friday night at Somerset. The incident occurred at a motel where Crisp and Officer Mike Ormerod, 32, were spending the night after accompanying the Prestonsburg football team to Somerset. It was reported that the gun, which was thought at the time to be unloaded, fired as Ormerod checked the trigger pull on the weapon. Apparently, Crisp walked by at the time and his foot moved in line with the shot. Crisp was taken by ambulance to Humana Hospital Lake Cumberland where he was admitted and later underwent surgery.

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The Kentucky Garden Journal

Most people think about stockpiling wood, putting up storm windows and getting out warm coats and mittens at

this time of year to winterize themselves and their homes. But how many think about winterizing their surroundings, namely their gardens and landscapes? Although azaleas would look strange wearing ski caps, we can help plants and soils weather the winter.

If you have not cleaned up your vegetable garden, remove all debris, putting pest-free material on your compost pile. Till the garden, have the soil tested, and you might still try to seed a cover crop.

Clean your garden tools, and store them along with extra fertilizers and pesticides in a secure, dry location. Store extra seeds in the refrigerator, and make notes of things you discovered from this year's garden that you want to try or avoid next year.

Bare root fruit trees may be available for planting now. Mulch all fruit trees and small fruit plantings (raspberries, grapes, etc.). The trunks of fruit trees may need wrapping for winter and animal protection.

Clean annual flower beds, get spring bulbs planted, divide and respace crowded perennials and mulch roses and perennials. If pansies are available, plant these hardy annuals for cold season color.

Lawn care at this time of year consists of raking up tree leaves, applying fall fertilizer, applying herbicides for broadleaf weed control and mowing if there is adequate growth. A soil test can be run to determine if lime is needed.

If grass growth has stopped, clean and service your mower and sharpen or replace the blade for spring mowing.

Landscape trees, shrubs, vines and ground covers can still be planted and should be fertilized and mulched. Corrective and training pruning can be started and carried through the winter. Wait to lightly prune evergreens until Christmas greens are needed.

Although the drought was foremost on most minds this summer, most people forget about watering when cold weather begins. Fall and winter watering will be very important this year to help to rejuvenate roots on stressed trees and shrubs that survived the summer. Once freezing temperatures start, be sure to drain hoses between waterings to prevent hose damage from ice formation.

Timely Tip: Some of your leftover garden seeds can be used by sprouting them for garnishes on salads and sandwiches. Legumes such as peas and beans, grains such as wheat and oats and grasses such as alfalfa produce nutritious sprouts.

Treat Cattle Now For Grubs And Lice

While treating cattle for grubs this fall, Kentucky beef cattle producers can go an extra step and treat their cattle for lice as well.

With a little extra effort, cattle producers may be able to keep their herds lice-free for the next year, said Dr. Chris Christensen, Extension entomologist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"Combining lice control with grub control means an additional treatment now, but the extra management time and effort it takes will be worth it," said Christensen. "Keeping cattle lice- and grub-free reduces some of the stress the animals go through in winter when cattle may be weaker than usual because of the cold weather and possible lower nutrition of stored feed."

Controlling grubs is especially important to young cattle. A heavy infestation of grubs can cause reductions in weight gains and a loss of feed efficiency, Christensen said.

Producers can treat cattle for grubs with a systemic insecticide applied to the animal's skin or fed in a mineral block or mix. One of three methods can be used to apply an insecticide to the cow's skin. With a pour-on, the insecticide is applied down the middle of the cow's back. In a spot treatment, the insecticide is applied to one place on the animal's back. Insecticide also may be applied with a high pressure sprayer.

Cattle producers should follow the instructions on the insecticide container's label, being careful to apply the recommended amount per animal.

While treating cattle for grubs, farmers can easily treat for lice with a dust, spray or pour-on insecticide to kill the adult lice. Christensen recommends a second treatment two weeks later to kill lice that were not killed the first time or that may have hatched since.

Lice populations tend to peak in cooler weather, said Christensen, so that cattle often have large lice populations in the spring. But treatments now will keep lice populations lower in the spring.

Producers must treat all the animals in the herd with both treatments for them to be effective, Christensen said. After the treatments, it is important to keep lice-free herds separate from herds that have not been treated, since lice are spread by body contact.

If this precaution is followed, said Christensen, producers may be able to keep their herds lice-free for the coming year.



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Conservation News

By CLARK ALLISON,

Last spring Herman Conn, of Dana, decided to do something about his pasture. To help solve the problem, Mr. Conn took advantage of the help offered by ASCS, the Extension Service, the Floyd Conservation District, and the Soil Conservation Service. The problem pasture needed to be limed, fertilized and seeded to cut down erosion and restore production. To get the job done, Mr. Conn first got a soil test through the Extension Service. The soil test told how much lime, fertilizer, and seed was needed to get a good stand of grasses and legumes. Next he signed up with ASCS for cost sharing. The ASCS cost share program for Floyd County pays 75% of the bill for recommended lime, fertilizer and seed to renovate a pasture.

Costs for ground preparation work were borne by Mr. Conn. "I am sure that more people would take advantage of conservation programs if they only knew about them," said Mr. Conn. The seed has come up well and next year there should be a thick stand of grasses and legumes. A good healthy sod will cut erosion to under two tons per acre per year and production will be way up compared to last year. Mr. Conn has signed up as a cooperator with the local Floyd County Conservation District. Through the Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service he will receive an aerial photo map of his farm, a soils map and a conservation plan to help him meet his goals on his farm. Already he has planned for management of his new pasture with controlled grazing, annual clipping, and maintenance lime and fertilizer as needed.

Landfill Training Set in Frankfort

The annual training and certification program for Kentucky's sanitary landfill operators is being held this week in Frankfort, officials of the state Division of Waste Management have announced.

Designed to promote environmentally sound solid-waste disposal practices, the program is for operators of permitted residential and contained landfills.

"Site operators who are responsible for daily management and operational decisions at these landfills are required by the state to attend this program," explained Alex Barber, Director of the Division of Waste Management.

Certification of these operators, granted upon adequate completion of the program and an examination, is required by state law, he explained. "However, we urge everyone interested in solid waste management to attend."

The training program will cover topics which include Kentucky's waste management program, landfill development and operational procedures and considerations. A trip to a landfill is scheduled for the second day of the program, with an examination on program material on the morning of the last day of the program.

Certification for landfill operators is valid for five years, division officials said.

IRS Announces Increase In Mileage Rate For Business Use of Cars

The standard mileage rate for cars used in business in 1983 will be 20.5 cents a mile—up from 20 cents a mile in 1982—according to the Internal Revenue Service. This new rate should be used to figure the allowable deduction taxpayers may take for business use of a car in 1983.

The 20.5-cent rate is for the first 15,000 miles of business use of a car that is not fully depreciated. Above 15,000 miles, and for all mileage of fully depreciated cars, the rate will remain at 11 cents, the same as in 1982. For the use of a car in charitable, medical and moving expense deductions the rate will stay at 9 cents a mile, as in 1982.

Taxpayers can deduct either the business standard mileage rate or actual expenses for the business use of the car. In addition to the standard mileage rate taxpayers can deduct the business related portion of parking, tolls and interest on the car loan.

The 20.5-cent rate is also used by the General Service Administration to reimburse federal employees for use of their cars on the job.

IRS Publication 463 entitled "Travel, Entertainment and Gift Expenses" gives more detail on employee business expenses that may be deducted on income tax returns. A copy of this publication may be obtained by writing the IRS Forms Distribution Center, P.O. Box 636, Florence, Kentucky 41042.

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





Linda Ronstadt — "What's New" (Elektra) — Linda Ronstadt has been trying for some time to record an album of "standards"; her first effort was shelved. Now, together with bandleader Nelson Riddle, she has made the cover (dressed in a pink organdy prom dress) of an album chock full of George Gershwin, Irving Berlin and the like.

Most of these songs were first popularized by Frank Sinatra and Billie Holiday. Miss Ronstadt certainly proves she is neither. But she is sincere in her effort, has an undeniably lovely voice — and when have a few beautiful ballads ever hurt anyone?

John Hiatt — "Riding with the King" (Geffen) — This is a great record. It's hard to explain exactly why this is a great record; it's a record that sort of has to grow on you for a while. The songs are direct yet subtle, basic yet complex, sometimes funny and sometimes poignant.

Hiatt sounds a little like Elvis Costello and a little like Mink DeVille; he's unpretentious, unassuming and quite delightful. "She Loves the Jerk" is "Rock On's best record that won't be a hit pick-of-the-week."

John Cougar Mellencamp — "Uh-Huh" (Riva/PolyGram) — Here's an album that's better than it had to be. After the unexpected platinum success of "American Fool," with the chart-toppers "Hurts So Good" and "Jack and Diane," John Cougar (now

using his given name) could have put out just about anything and sold it. But "Uh-Huh" is well-crafted, energetic rock 'n' roll. Sure, it wins the Rolling Stones sound-a-like of the year award, but there are worse groups to sound like. And there is something so intrinsically American about Cougar that even Stones shtick becomes his own.

One of the greatest achievements of the 20th century was putting a man on the moon. That feat of man and machine began in the isolated Mojave Desert when Chuck Yeager became the first man to break the sound barrier. Then the Russians startled the world and put the first satellite into space. The space race had begun.

The pilots of yesterday would become the astronauts of the space age. They had to have "the right stuff," the right combination of ability, stamina and just plain guts. The word "astronaut" means "star voyager," and test pilots were the logical choice to become the first men to venture into space.

The men picked would have the eyes of the world and history upon them. Their story — those who made it into space, those who didn't, and those who should have — make up this three-hour portrait of the first American heroes of the space age.

Philip Kaufman wrote and directed this film, based on Tom Wolfe's 1979 book. The Mercury astronauts are heroes, but heroes are human as well,

and this tale chronicles their story, their reasons for becoming astronauts, and the effect on wives and families. It is done so well one feels as though the material hasn't been touched yet, even though the film is more than three hours long.

As an ensemble piece of acting, however, those playing the seven astronauts are excellent to a man, as are the actresses playing their wives. The parallel plot of pilot Chuck Yeager, who showed courage but himself never went into space, provides a superb counterpoint to the astronauts' stories.

"The Right Stuff" is not a flawless film (its portrayal of politicians, especially LBJ, reporters, and the astronaut-program recruiters, is simplistic), but in the end it is as stirring and moving as any such epic would like to be. As for helping out John Glenn in his candidacy for president, suffice to say this will not hurt his chances. After seeing the film, though, you may join a "Chuck Yeager for President" committee.

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


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

Tutorial Classes Aid Faltering Students

Over 4,000 students turned to them for help last year at Morehead State University.

When classes get tough, MSU students turn to their tutors. There are 12 student tutors this semester, helping others in areas from drafting and music theory to general education courses.

Employed through institutional workshops, some tutors come through the honors program and others are recommended by the head of the department in which they tutor. Each student tutor is screened and put through an orientation and a training program.

Jeff Rice, a junior data processing major from Grayson, is one such student.

"I got started in the tutoring program when I came here as a freshman to be tutored. Then I heard they were looking for tutors so I applied for the job and got it," he said.

For those students who are working below the college level, the tutors can help them in math, writing and study/reading skill areas. On the college level, tutors can help in math, English, science, business, data processing, drafting and music theory areas.

"Most students," said Betty Moran, coordinator of Special Services, "are looking for help in a certain class or want to improve their grades."

A tutoring session will last from thirty minutes to an hour and is usually conducted at the Learning Lab in Room 209 of Allie Young Hall.

"Each student fills out an intake sheet to give information about their academic need and then we set up an appointment," explained Moran.

"We tutors get to know a lot of people

we wouldn't get to meet otherwise. When I work with a student on a regular basis and I can see the progress they are making, it gives me a good feeling to know I really helped that person," Rice said of the rewards of tutoring.

A student may set up regular appointments to meet with a tutor throughout a semester, or come in once or twice for help before an exam, according to Moran.

The Learning Lab is also equipped with self-help, audio-visual materials for those students who want to brush up on a skill. The materials cover math, writing, and reading/studying skills, according to Janet Bignon, learning specialist at Special Services. The lab is open from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, and student tutors are on duty.

"I think our program is good because it gives students one of their peers to work with," said Rice. "Many times a student may not understand something and they are afraid to ask a question during class, but they will ask a tutor. They feel more at ease working with them."

The Learning Lab and tutoring services are free. Appointments can be made by calling (606) 783-2005. Additional information is available at (606) 783-2005.

Q. I will soon be receiving radiation treatments for cancer. Is there some literature I can read that will help me understand it better? What are the side effects, and does everyone have them?

A. The Cancer Hopeline has a free brochure called "Radiation and You: A Guide to Self-Help During Treatment," which has been very helpful to many patients. It answers many questions and has general suggestions for minimizing discomfort.

The side effects of radiation therapy vary greatly with the individual. They may range from none to slight in some patients to severe in a few. This depends on several factors including the intensity of the treatment, location of the treatment, and the patient's general health and ability to tolerate the radiation. The health care team providing the radiation therapy will undoubtedly discuss possible side effects and the particular measures they recommend to minimize them.

Some of the side effects may be dry or itchy skin, redness or a tanned look to the skin, hair loss in the area radiated, fatigue, a weak feeling, loss of appetite, constipation, diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, a feeling of fullness, and mouth, throat or ear discomfort when radiation is applied to the head and neck area.

No one experiences all of these side effects, and much can be done to minimize some of them. If you have discomfort, report it to the physician and ask his/her advice. Do not take any remedy without consulting the physician. In addition, your attitude as the patient plays a very significant role in determining how severe any side effects might be.

The Secret of Success In Growing

Perhaps you plan to plant trees soon and raise flowers. Maybe some trees for fruit, some for shade, others for ornament. You may have already planted some trees; this is a good time—until the sap begins to rise. The suggestions given here will help you have strong and thrifty trees and wonderful flowers too. It is not a widely known secret, but its truth has been proved by many of the most learned scientists, and by sound, down-to-earth nurserymen.

Let's take one of these, Mr. John Tobe, a highly experienced nurseryman of Canada; he also is the editor of a widely read magazine, the Provoker. Mr. Tobe wrote recently in his magazine: "I talk to my trees the same as if they were living beings...which they are. I even caress them with my hands as I talk to them, for I know they will respond to the warm love I have in my heart for trees." Then he tells how he performs his ritual: "Most every day, I visit my growing trees; I touch each one gently and say: 'We love you and we need you. I want to help you thrive and grow strong. I will do all I can to take good care of you, and I only wish I knew more than I do now.'"

Mr. Tobe tells how he was given a half-dead young peach tree, too dormant and dead looking to sell. It was about to be tossed out and burned. He took that apparently dead peach tree and carefully set it out in good soil, for he could still discern a spark of life in its roots. Daily he watered it, talked to it and coaxed it to come alive and grow; he poured out his love for the puny looking peach tree and sure enough it finally revived and is now a flourishing tree, bearing a nice crop of peaches.

"So I know the trees do respond and listen to me when I talk to them," he said, in conclusion.

Now there are the most remarkable experiments of Steve Backster of New York, who is an expert in the use of the polygraph. After years of experiment, Mr. Backster demonstrated beyond all doubt that plants have an intelligence and wisdom not yet fully understood by us benumbed humans. He proved that trees can recognize their owner, that they respond to any tragic happening nearby; let an animal, such as a deer, lie down in agony beneath a tree, and the tree is conscious of its agony and is shocked by its death. Backster also proved that plants and vegetables have E.S.P. and can somehow communicate with one another even at a distance. He calls it a "primary perception," which we too prosaic mortals cannot begin to understand.

Even more remarkable were the experiments of the late Dr. Kirlian, famed Russian scientist. By the use of high-speed electron photography, he proved by actual photos that plants and trees have "two bodies," that they are surrounded by lights of various colors, which he calls "bio-luminescence." There is a physical body, and there is an "energy body, or "spiritual body" enfolding the physical body. This energy body trains the tree how to grow; it is this "energy body," which listens and is moved by those who talk to the trees.

Even more amazing are the experiments conducted by Dr. Lozanov, head of The Institute of Suggestology and Parapsychology of Bulgaria.

His Institute used the power of suggestion on plants, and in many cases, Dr. Lozanov states: "We made the plants grow three times higher than the normal growth."

It has also been proved that plants, more especially flowers, shrink and cringe in fear before a person who has vile hatred for anything on earth in his heart. It has also been demonstrated that love of trees and plants is a prime factor in growing beautiful and thrifty ones.

So if you have planted your trees this year, or plan to plant them before the sap begins to rise, give them good care, keep them watered well, love and protect them and talk to them the same as you would to a child or perhaps to some old friend. You may be amazed at the results!

Southern actor Robert Durrett portrays Samuel Langhorne Clemens, better known as Mark Twain, in his one-man show, "An Evening with Mark Twain," airing on KET Wednesday, December 7, at 8:00 p.m. during KET's Quiet Membership Campaign.

Durrett takes viewers through the 75 years of Twain's life, from boyhood days spent on the Mississippi to his final years just prior to World War I, as he observed America's struggle to grow and build itself into a unified nation. Durrett uses the sayings and mannerisms of Twain—the lecturer, traveler, reporter, storyteller, writer and humorist.

Participation in ASC elections is open to all farmers regardless of race, religion, sex, color, or national origin.




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Baldrige Receives Honors

SSI Eligibility Re-Examined In Big Sandy Region

Most people in the Big Sandy area getting Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments because they are 65 or older or disabled or blind have their eligibility re-examined each year, Jim Kelly, Social Security District Director for the Big Sandy Area, said recently.

SSI is a Federal program administered by Social Security that provides a basic cash income to people 65 or older or blind or disabled who have little income and do not own much.

The reason for the re-examination is to insure that people getting these payments continue to be eligible and are getting the right payment amount, Kelly said.

The amount of the SSI payment depends on the person's other income and his or her living arrangements. People getting these payments should promptly report any change in their assets, income, or living arrangements that can affect their payment rate or their eligibility.

The annual re-examinations are part of the continuing process designed to make sure that SSI payments are properly paid.

SSI payments are made from general funds of the U.S. Treasury; not from Social Security taxes.

Taunya is a senior sociology and psychology major and the daughter of Ted and Violet Shelton of McDowell.

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
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

The Federal Emergency Management Agency gives notice of the proposed determinations of base (100-year) flood elevations, in accordance with Section 110 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Pub. L. 93-234), 87 Stat. 980, which added Section 1363 to the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (Title XIII of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (Pub. L. 90-448), 42 U.S.C. 4001-4128, and 44 CFR 67.4(a).

These elevations, together with the flood plain management measures required by Section 60.3 of the program regulations, are the minimum that are required. They should not be construed to mean the community must change in any existing ordinances that are more stringent in their flood plain management requirements. The community may at any time enact stricter requirements on its own, or pursuant to policies established by other Federal, State, or regional entities. These proposed elevations will also be used to calculate the appropriate flood insurance premium rates for new buildings and their contents and for the second layer of insurance on existing buildings and their contents.

Pursuant to the provisions of 5 USC 605 (b), the Associate Director, to whom authority has been delegated by the Director, Federal Emergency Management Agency, hereby certifies that the proposed flood elevation determinations, if promulgated, will not have a significant determination under Section 1363 forms the basis for new local ordinances, which, if adopted by a local community, will govern future construction within the floodplain area. The elevation determinations, however, impose no restriction unless and until the local community voluntarily adopts floodplain ordinances in accord with these elevations. Even if ordinances are adopted in compliance with Federal standards, the elevations prescribe how high to build in the floodplain and do not proscribe development. Thus, this action only forms the basis for future local actions. It imposes no new requirement; of itself it has no economic impact.

**Troubled Waters Ahead
Economist Predicts,
Cites "Fed" For Woes**

The United States is about to be shocked by an election year recession, and perhaps a world financial crisis, if the Federal Reserve does not immediately cease its strangulation of the nation's money supply. In the first half of 1983, money was gushing into the economy at a rate unprecedented in peacetime. From January to June, the money supply (M-1) increased by 37 billion dollars. Since June 8, however, M-1 has increased by only 3 billion dollars. The growth rate of M-1 has thus been slashed from 15% to 2%.

The last time this happened was in 1981. From April 1980 to April 1981, M-1 grew 11%. Then the Federal Reserve slammed on the monetary brakes. From April to September, 1981, the money supply actually declined slightly. As a result, the economy plunged into a recession that very few saw coming. History is now repeating itself right before our unseeing eyes.

One of the handful of economists who foresaw, far in advance, the severe recession of 1981-82 (and who foresaw the current strong recovery) was Nobel laureate economist Milton Friedman. Recently Professor Friedman has again raised the red flag, warning of economic storms ahead. In his Newsweek column of September 26, 1983, Friedman said:

The monetary explosion from July 1982 to July 1983 leaves no satisfactory way out of our present situation. The Fed's stepping on the brakes will appear to have no immediate effect. Rapid recovery will continue under the impetus of earlier monetary growth. With its historical shortsightedness, the Fed will be tempted to step still harder on the brake—just as the failure of rapid monetary growth in late 1982 to generate immediate recovery led it to keep its collective foot on the accelerator much too long. The result is bound to be renewed stagflation—recession accompanied by rising inflation and high interest rates.

The proper course for the Federal Reserve to follow is one of slow, steady, predictable growth of money supply. Over time, this would steady the economy and significantly lower interest rates, inflation, and unemployment.

Instead, the Federal Reserve continues to accelerate and brake, accelerate and brake, which is why the American economy continues to suffer from economic whiplash.

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
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


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

Time for Giving Thanks Even Amid Adversity

Thanksgiving season—the traditional time we all count our blessings—may be a little tougher than normal down on the farm this year.

The drought that devastated this year's crops has left many Kentucky farmers wondering what it is about 1983 they should appreciate.

The dry weather came on the heels of spring floods, which followed two seasons of high interest rates, drops in the value of farmland and unprecedented attacks on tobacco support programs.

In short, these seem not to be the best of agricultural times.

Saddled as they now are with record high debt loads, decimated incomes and, half vacant bins, farmers may be justified in adopting a lukewarm attitude toward the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday season.

But on further reflection, maybe the bad years are the ones Thanksgiving is best suited for. It's easy to be upbeat when things are going well. But the real measure of human character may lie in the ability to find the silver lining when the storm clouds are thickest.

For that reason, the following list may be a useful reference as November 24 nears. It's a compilation of blessings for 1983, some of which apply to farmers specifically, others that may also be appropriate for all those non-farmers who depend on agriculture for the food and fiber that is vital to their lives.

That list might include the following:

1. Bad weather, the scourge of 1983, is still news in Kentucky, not the norm. Take Russian farmers for instance. Complicating their unending duel with bureaucratic planners and socialistic roadblocks, their weather is bad every year, and bad enough to drastically affect harvests two or three of every five years. One really severe drought every few decades doesn't sound so bad by comparison.

2. The most persistent farm problem year in and year out is not shortages but surpluses. Currently oversupply "problems" are affecting wheat farmers, the dairy industry and tobacco growers, and

before the bad weather of '83, supplies of corn and soybeans were well over the amounts needed to meet market demands. Surpluses are a problem yes, but most would agree they're less of a problem for all concerned than running out of food.

3. With the worst drought in 50 years affecting much of the nation, one might expect a surge in supermarket food prices. But in Farm Bureau's most recent statewide marketbasket survey, the overall index actually dropped. Bargain meat prices negated slight hikes in other categories, and at least for the time being, forestalled any major drought penalty for food shoppers in the state.

4. There's a financial crisis on the farm, many say. And all farmers who are feeling the pinch of lower net income would agree. But with things as bad as they are, foreclosures and bankruptcies are affecting only a tiny percentage of operations, less than 1 percent in many areas. That leaves roughly 99 percent of farmers who are at worst, still in business. We all should give thanks for those numbers.

5. Farmers have had some supporting cushions to pad the shock this year. There was the PIK program which cleared much of the grain surplus from the market pipeline and added cash to an otherwise cashless year for participants. In 107 counties, those who suffered most can apply for low-interest loans. There are also the various price support programs. And not the least significant, there is an active and effective farm organization—Farm Bureau—serving as a giant transmitter, passing along the wishes of the farm community to policy makers in Frankfort and Washington.

Before these thoughts are concluded, do not forget the vast majority of Kentuckians who don't make their living on the farm, but depend on those who do for a wholesome and abundant food supply.

To those members of the consuming public, farmers ask that you consider your stake in their success.

You may debate everything from so-called farm subsidies to foreign trade, but there's no debating the fact that Americans have access to the best supply of food and fiber available anywhere in the world.

And you have the added assurance that come springtime, another crop, possibly one of record size, will go in the ground.

That seems as good a reason as any for saying "thanks."

Stress Produces Burnout, A Part of Today's World

Burnout. It can happen to anyone. And with the high level of stress associated with today's fast-paced society, it is happening to more and more people.

Karen Hammons, instructor of education at Morehead State University, conducts workshops on preventing and dealing with burnout. She lists the symptoms as depression, tiredness, violence, alcoholism, extreme changes of mood and behavior and impatience with oneself and others.

"Mothers who stay home with young children can very easily burnout," says Hammons. "They are isolated, have nobody to share their problems, no adult to speak to during the day."

Agency Will Intercept Errant Hubbies' Checks

Beginning next January some unemployed parents in Kentucky who don't agree to have part of their unemployment insurance benefits go to pay their court-ordered child support will have their unemployment insurance checks intercepted by the Cabinet for Human Resources through legal action.

Since July the cabinet has diverted more than \$9,000 from the unemployment insurance checks of 262 Kentuckians who voluntarily consented to have part of their UI check go to pay delinquent child support obligations, according to Human Resources Secretary Buddy Adams.

"When a parent owes child support for children who are receiving Aid to Families with Dependent Children benefits, we are mandated to try to collect from the parent to repay the AFDC program. In the case of unemployed persons who owe child support, we ask them to voluntarily agree to allow a portion of the benefits to be forwarded to the Division of Child Support Enforcement," said Adams.

Ky. Legislation Targets Child Exploiter Measure

John Walsh, whose story about his son's abduction was dramatized in the recent NBC movie "ADAM", endorsed the proposals contained in the final report of the Kentucky Task Force on Exploited and Missing Children during a press conference in Louisville with Task Force Chairman Mitch McConnell.

McConnell, who is also Jefferson County Judge/Executive, said that the group had made progress toward adoption of the proposals. According to McConnell, "The Task Force's legislative package has been presented to the General Assembly's Interim Joint Committee on Judiciary-Criminal and talks have begun with several legislators who might sponsor the package." He described the reception from Frankfort lawmakers as "cordial and encouraging."

Walsh gave unqualified backing to the entire report, and commented on McConnell's leadership in the field, but singled out from the report the proposed statewide computer system, the mandatory detention of individuals who commit sex crimes, and mandatory "body safety" programs in Kentucky schools as being especially important.

Walsh strengthened his endorsement with an impressive number of statistics and examples relating to the Task Force recommendations. "Since Florida began its mandatory computer program four months ago, we have entered 3400 missing child descriptions. All of these descriptions are then passed on to the NCIC computer." He added that the automatic entry into the NCIC computer was important because only 25 percent of law enforcement agencies nationwide are now entering missing child cases.

The need to get child exploiters off the street was also stressed by Walsh. "Studies show that most child exploiters have committed their crimes 68 times before they are finally apprehended. That large number, combined with the growing number of experts who believe that this criminal-type person is incurable, leads me to believe that we must remove them from society. If we do not, there will be more child exploitation/murder cases like John Gray's, a case where an individual was released from an Iowa prison so he could later prey on 33 boys in Chicago."

On the subject of a mandatory "body safety" program, Walsh said it was "absolutely ludicrous" that programs were not already in place. "We owe our children at least a 50-50 chance to reach adulthood without being molested. The most obvious way to do that is to teach them how to protect themselves," Walsh said.

Walsh was in Kentucky to join McConnell at a public symposium Thursday night titled: "Update on Exploited and Missing Children in the United States." McConnell and Walsh have served as the co-chairman and chairman of the National Child Tragedies Coalition since the organization's inception.

Nature Trails...

Recently, while studying gray squirrels in the woods, I found myself wishing I had as much nature lore as that little animal has in its small, round head.

It shows its natural wisdom in many ways. One of these is a strong sense of thrift which we humans would do well to imitate. In the fall, when food is plentiful, the gray squirrel prepares for winter days when food will be scarce. It digs holes in the ground and buries hundreds of acorns in rows, then marks the spot by gnawing the bark from a bush nearby. It knows that a winter freeze will take the bitter taste from the acorns and make them good to eat. It also buries black walnuts in a row. Before burying a walnut, it removes the thick, green hull with its sharp teeth, thus getting its mouth dyed brown with walnut stain. Sometimes the squirrel has trouble pushing the walnut down the small hole it has dug; it then pushes hard on the nut with its nose and forces it to the

bottom of the hole. Then it covers the walnut.

Gray squirrels are nature's tree planters. Most of the oaks you see in the woods were planted by the squirrels when they buried their acorns.

Squirrels belong to the rodents. They're gnawers, and you can hear the "skruk" of their sharp teeth as they gnaw the hard shells of hickory nuts. They have to keep gnawing a whole lifetime. If they didn't gnaw almost constantly, their teeth would grow too long and lock up their mouths, as has happened to pet squirrels.

The squirrel's tail is the largest of all small animals, also the most useful. The long, bushy tail gives the animal the book name, "sciurus," which means, "an animal that shades itself with its tail." It should be, rather, "an animal that uses its tail for a cloak to keep warm in winter."

Squirrels have a slick way of escaping their enemies. Once I saw a dog chasing a squirrel, and the squirrel ran straight to a big oak which it had marked near ground level with its sharp teeth. The oak had a hollow bough in which the squirrel hid. Again, I saw a man chase two squirrels up a hickory that stood more than 100 feet high. He picked up a dead brush from the ground and began to scrape and rake it on the bark of the hickory, making a harsh, scary sound. It frightened those squirrels so badly that they climbed to the very top of that high tree and clung there dizzily, half frightened to death. I begged the man to stop raking.

"You'll cause those squirrels to jump, and they'll surely be killed when they hit the ground," I pleaded.

But he would not stop making the frightening noise, and when the two squirrels leaped out into sheer space I shut my eyes to keep from seeing them die.

"Watch those squirrels come down!" the man cried. I looked then, and the squirrels were using their tails as a brake on their fall. They landed easily and ran away, none the worse, despite the jump from that dizzy height.

I truly believe that gray squirrels enjoy summer woods more than any other animal. I've seen them leaping among the trees as they played, often chasing one another up and down tree trunks. They like to frolic on the ground, cut capers and run races.

But talk about a sad lot of squirrels—it's when they see summer dying and winter coming on. It's then they begin to make a sorrowful lament that's so near to crying that it always touches my heart.

One cold November day, I went into the deep woods to watch the dramatic spectacle of falling leaves. The cold wind blew hard through the woods and slapped the dead leaves against tree trunks like open hands. It lodged the big magnolia leaves in the branches of a tree, where they hung precariously like ragged derelicts.

Suddenly, as I stood watching, I heard a sound from a tree overhead. Lying up there on a limb was a gray squirrel, and he was making the saddest sound I ever heard. It was plainly weeping for the dying summer and coming winter. As I stood there big snowflakes began to flutter down among the barren trees. Seeing them, the squirrel quit his crying and leaped inside a hollow branch, bidding the coming winter goodbye.

No more than seven students from each high school may participate. Jack Connell, supervisor of music for Knoxville Public Schools in Tennessee, will direct the High School Honor Band, and Norden will direct the Junior High Honor Band.

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
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Job Training Classes Slated in Paintsville

A special training class for eligible welfare recipients in the Big Sandy Area Development District will be sponsored in November, December and January by the Cabinet for Human Resources. The classes in homemaker/home health care will begin November 28 at the Mayo Vocational Technical School in Paintsville.

The class is part of the federally funded Preventacare program and will be limited to 20 eligible people who receive benefits under the Aid to Families with Dependent Children program. Participants who successfully complete the seven-week training course will be employed by the Sandy Valley Senior Citizens Program based in Prestonsburg.

Human Resources Cabinet Secretary Buddy Adams said Preventacare is aimed directly at providing a needed service and some necessary training for welfare recipients who will in turn supply the service. "Many of these people who will take part in this program are unemployed due to a lack of education, job training or marketable skills," he said. "We hope to provide them with the opportunity to pursue an existing job and to become self-sufficient."

Preventacare involves the development of a network of in-home services to better enable elderly and disabled persons to live in their own homes safely and comfortably. "At the same time, it will provide jobs for people who receive AFDC benefits," Adams said. "The people who receive this service might otherwise have to enter a long-term care institution."

The program is open to AFDC recipients who have not been placed in jobs or job training through the Work Incentive Program. Applicants must have a valid driver's license, be at least 18 years old, in good health and able to read on a seventh-grade level.

During training, participants will continue to receive AFDC, medical and child care benefits. They also receive incentive pay, work clothing, lunch allowances and reimbursement for transportation costs.

Those participants who get a passing grade at the end of the course will be placed in jobs that are funding-guaranteed for at least 12 months. Each job will be in an employee's county of residence. Employees under Preventacare receives wages, fringe benefits and reimbursement for mileage incurred during working hours. They also retain their medical cards for the year.

Applications for enrollment are available now at the Department for Manpower Services offices in: Pikeville at 216 College Street, Prestonsburg on North Lake Drive.

Interested AFDC recipients may also contact their public assistance caseworker for more information.

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




