Police arrest man seeking fight in road

BRANHAM'S CREEK — A Galveston man, who police say was armed at the time, was arrested last week after being discovered in the middle of the road along Branham's Creek, allegedly challenging those nearby to fight with him.

Police reported that Thomas Griffin McNeil, 26, was standing in the road yelling at his neighbors when they arrived.

After arriving, Kentucky State Police Trooper Rick Conn arrested McNeil, reporting the Galveston resident was carrying a loaded Beretta .25 automatic pistol in his right front coat pocket.

McNeil was taken into custody within minutes after police responded and charged with misdemeanor charges of carrying a concealed deadly weapon and menacing.

McNeil was placed at the Floyd County Detention Center under a \$500 cash bond after pleading innocent to the charges and ordered to have no contact with his neighbors upon his release.

He is due back in court Oct. 9.

Vote-buying investigation widens

PIKEVILLE — A federal grand jury is asking questions about state and federal campaigns as it proceeds in an election fraud case against a wealthy Pikeville lawyer and coal operator.

Witnesses who have faced the grand jury in the investigation of Ross Harris have answered questions about contributions to Attorney General Ben Chandler's

race for governor; the 2002 re-election campaign of Republican U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell; and the 2000 campaign of state Sen. Johnny Ray Turner, D-Drift, said Michael deBourbon, a Pikeville attorney who represents several of the witnesses.

Harris is charged in a federal indictment with giving illegal campaign donations to district judge candidate John Doug Hays in Pike County last year. Harris allegedly

passed the money through 21 "straw" contributors — making it appear the other people had given, when in fact Harris allegedly provided the funds.

Harris also had fund-raisers for Chandler and McConnell and supported Turner.

John Huff, a property manager for Harris' coal companies, said he was asked about giving to Chandler when he testified to the grand jury about his contribution to

Hays.

Huff and his wife, Sheryl, a teacher's aide, each gave \$1,000 to Chandler's campaign at a large fund-raising event that Harris hosted just before Christmas last year, according to records at the state Registry of Election Finance.

Huff said he made contributions with his own money, not money from Harris.

Current, former Pike judges named in lawsuit

PIKEVILLE — The woman who filed a sex-related complaint against then-Pike County Circuit Judge Charles Lowe Jr. last year has now filed a lawsuit in federal court that again names Lowe, as well as current-Pike County Family Court Judge Larry Thompson.

The lawsuit, filed by Debbi Hylton-Mullins, wife of Pike County District Judge Darrell Mullins, restates allegations that Lowe forced her to perform sexual favors for and with him while presiding over an adoption case of hers, but also accuses Thompson, whom she says was her attorney at the time.

Mullins asserts in her lawsuit, filed Monday on her behalf by Louisville attorney Fred R. Radolovich in U.S. District Court in Pikeville, that

Thompson sidestepped proper procedure while handling the legal issues connected with her daughter's adoption.

Mullins claims Thompson "failed to properly pursue the termination of the child's natural parents" before the adoption, which eventually caused her to lose custody of the child for a period of time.

Mullins claims Thompson, did this as part of his "desire to attain circuit judgeship" and to "curry favor" with Lowe, who presided over Mullins' adoption case.

Mullins, who has been employed in various county and state positions, says that after losing custody of her adopted daughter, she was then made to perform sexual favors for and with Lowe in order to regain and maintain custody.

State, mother sue doctor

PRESTONSBURG — An attending emergency room doctor at Our Lady of the Way Hospital was named in a lawsuit last week which claims he overlooked a piece of wood lodged in a puncture wound sustained during a all-terrain vehicle accident during the fall of 2000.

Langley resident Sharon Prater claims Dr. Steven Conrotto left a piece of wood or stick inside a puncture wound to her son's right upper arm, leaving the wound to become abscessed.

In her suit Prater says she took her son, Jonathan Prater, to the emergency room at Our Lady of the Way in Martin after he wrecked while driving an all-terrain vehicle on Oct. 27, 2000.

During the course of the visit, Prater claims Conrotto evaluated her son and then discharged him.

She later claims that an "abscess developed and a large foreign body consisting of a piece of wood (or a stick)" was later discovered by another, unnamed doctor, further contending that the item was left in the wound by

Grand jury returns indictments against 40

PRESTONSBURG — A Wellington man was among 40 people included in open indictments handed down by a Floyd County grand jury yesterday.

A 10-count indictment was handed down late yesterday afternoon against Justin M. Endicott, 22, of Wellington, charging him with various assault, threat-

ening and endangerment violations, as well as stalking and imprisonment.

According to the indictment, Endicott will now face in circuit court proceedings charges of first-degree unlawful imprisonment, fourth-degree assault, two counts of first-degree wanton endangerment, terroristic threatening, violating a protective order and first-degree stalking for allegedly holding a knife to Natasha Endicott to keep her from leaving her home.

The charges within the indictment stem from an incident allegedly occurring on Dec. 4, 2002. It was then Endicott allegedly held Natasha Endicott at knifepoint to keep her from leaving her home, slammed her head into a wall, held a knife to her throat, pushed her while she was holding Elexus Bailey Endicott, threatened to kill her and violated a 500-foot restraining order.

Also named as a victim in the indict-

ment is Charlie Blair. The indictment alleges that on the same day, Endicott hit Blair, also held a knife to his throat and threatened to kill him, resulting in charges of fourth-degree assault, first-degree wanton endangerment and terroristic threatening.

■ **TUCSON, Ariz.** — Talk about a stink.

The owner of a pooper scooper business here sued a competitor to protect a company slogan.

"We're No. 1 in the No. 2 Business" is the slogan registered with the Secretary of State's Office by Loren's Pooper-Scooper Service.

"You kind of take a stinky job, and you kind of try to make something bad into something good," said owner Loren

Hoppens, who is hired to pick up pet waste.

But when a competitor, Stinky's Pet Poop Pickup Service, allegedly started handing out business cards with the phrase "No. 1 in the No. 2 business," Hoppens filed a lawsuit in Pima County Superior Court claiming that Stinky's and owner Tracy Sartain were infringing on his trademark.

Sartain said Friday the matter was resolved. "It's been settled," she said, declining further com-

ment. No mention of the slogan or the lawsuit was on the Stinky's Web site.

■ **MELBOURNE, Australia** — Wrong airline. Wrong city.

A woman trying to fly to Hong Kong accidentally ended up in the Australian city of Melbourne after getting on the wrong plane in Los Angeles.

A computerized boarding system at the Los Angeles airport was not working at the time the woman boarded a Cathay Pacific flight to Hong Kong and ground crew did not notice that she mistakenly got onto a Qantas jet instead, the Australian carrier said Tuesday.

The passenger, whose identity was not released, sat in an empty seat and did not realize her mistake until the plane was approaching Melbourne Airport, a Qantas spokeswoman said.

She said Qantas had arranged for the woman to stay in Melbourne on Sunday night and put her on a Qantas flight to Hong Kong on Monday. Her luggage, which remained in Los Angeles when she failed to board the Cathay Pacific flight, was on its way to Hong Kong to meet her.

■ **DIXON, Ill.** — Mary Crombie marked her 113th birthday without ceremony but with familiar optimism about her beloved Chicago Cubs, notwithstanding their 94-year unlucky streak.

Following baseball's lovable losers for so long, though, has taught her not to predict a World Series victory. That hasn't happened since 1908, the year she turned 18 and Chicago beat Detroit in the fall classic.

"They will do well," Crombie declared, going no further. Unlike the Cubs, the Dixon

resident continues to impress those around her year after year. At 113, she remains largely independent while living at the Heritage Square retirement home in Dixon.

"She is remarkable," registered nurse Mary Taylor, who monitors Crombie and the other residents, said Wednesday. "She enjoys flowers and takes care of her own needs. She makes her bed every day — and it has to be done in just a certain way."

As much as anything now, she loves the Cubs, who recognized her support with a birthday letter in 2001. "She comes alive when those games are on," Taylor said. "And she knows the players."

■ **AVIS, Pa.** — A volunteer fire company in central Pennsylvania has taken a novel approach to fund raising: Instead of bake sales and bingo games, they decided to buy a tavern.

The Avis Fire Co. purchased the South Avis Inn last month and plans to expand the tavern to include a restaurant.

"We're trying to diversify our income. It's getting harder, and harder to raise money," said Dave Winkleman, company president.

Income from weekly bingo games and an annual carnival has shrunk in recent years. Faced with dwindling funds and increasing costs, the fire company in Clinton County started looking for ways to generate income.

The inn purchase was completed June 18. Due to regulations of the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board, a separate organization had to be formed to run the inn, so the Avis Fire Co. Civic Association was created. The fire company bought the building and leases it to the civic association, which runs the tavern and rents the apartments in the building.

Conrotto. Prater says the piece of wood was the item that had caused the puncture to her son's arm during his accident.

According to Prater's lawsuit, her son had to undergo surgery and medical treatment to have the piece of wood removed, all of which was paid for by the Kentucky Medical Assistance Program, which is also named as a plaintiff in the lawsuit.

Prater is asking that this amount be reimbursed to the medical program and that her son be awarded judgment against Conrotto for past, present and future mental and physical pain, suffering and anguish, as well as a jury trial and any attorney fees that might arise from the court proceedings.

Prater asserts in her claim that Conrotto's "failure to explore for, irrigate, locate and or discover" the piece of wood was "beneath and less than the standard of care of skill" one might expect from a doctor.

Because the state medical assistance program covered the

medical costs related to Prater's claims of surgery and medical treatment, the attorney representing the Langley family, Jerry Patton, asked in the lawsuit that the proper amount be returned to that agency.

According to documents filed alongside the lawsuit's complaint, the medical bills as of Sept. 3, 2002, rested at just over \$6,000.

This sexual "scheme" continued in a "pattern of perversity and outrageous conduct" with the knowledge of both Lowe and Thompson for nearly a decade from the early 1990s through 2001, Mullins claims.

that the commission could have sought to remove him had he not already resigned.

Lowe resigned in April from his longtime position as Pike County Circuit Judge amid Mullins' sex-related allegations. Days after his resignation, the Judicial Conduct Commission reprimanded him and indicated

Mullins, who says the custody of her adoptive daughter remains in challenge now that she has "ceased her servitudinal posture", is asking for judgment against Lowe and Thompson for violating her First, Fifth, Thirteenth and Fourteenth Amendment rights, punitive damages, monetary damage awards, a trial by jury and attorney fees.

Murphy was also found guilty of one count of attempting to elude a police or traffic officer in

ter, Brandais said.

However, those who have already registered for assistance from May flooding will need to register again for assistance in dealing with last month's disaster,

The state averages one disaster declaration a year, according to Brandais, which puts the numbers for the current year in grim perspective.

"Kentucky averages about one declared disaster a year and here we are halfway through July and we've had three already," said Brandais.

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

Chandler's strategy could backfire

Attorney General Ben Chandler has taken on a new opponent in his bid to become governor: Gov. Paul Patton. Having a party's nominee running against the incumbent governor from his party must be considered a risky strategy.

Relations between Chandler and Patton — which have never been close — became a complete break recently when Chandler called for Patton's immediate resignation after the governor pardoned two aides and two union officials of charges related to Patton's 1995 campaign for governor.

Chandler had a right to be upset. The attorney had doggedly pursued the case for eight years — only to have it pulled out from under him by the governor's action. The governor was wrong to use his power to bring to a halt a case involving alleged crimes by his own campaign. Talk about a conflict of interest.

On the day after Patton's action, Rep. Susan Westrom, Chandler's choice as chairwoman of the Kentucky Democratic Party, sounded more like the attorney general was turning against the incumbent governor instead of U.S. Rep. Ernie Fletcher, the Republican gubernatorial nominee.

Westrom called the pep rally in which her appointment was announced a "new day" for the state's Democratic Party, pronouncing the "good ol' boy" network dead.

While Patton certainly has brought his political career to a disappointing end by his confessed affair with a western Kentucky businesswoman and scandals that have plagued the Transportation Cabinet, it should be remembered that the current governor also has done many good things for the state.

Running against the incumbent from your own party could easily backfire. After all, if Chandler is successful in convincing voters that he represents a change in the status quo, many may choose to opt for an even more dramatic change by choosing the other candidate.

Why did Harris make contributions in Floyd?

The growing field of politicians recently sprinkled into the brewing pot of controversy which is political fund raiser Ross Harris have soared, if not in numbers, certainly in status.

The Associated Press reported Monday that U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell has officially been included during witness questioning in connection to a vote-buying case of which Harris is allegedly one of the key players.

Although McConnell said Monday he had not been asked for records by investigators about Harris' addition to his reelection finances, authorities are looking.

Does McConnell even need the deep pockets of influence Harris is reputedly able to provide?

Of course not. It could just be that Harris felt bad about leaving him out. He has, after all, given to more than a dozen

Pike County politicians in the last few years and at least once to a hopeful for Lexington's mayor, not to mention eight candidates right here in Floyd County.

According to Kentucky's Registry of Election Finance, Harris has touched nearly every facet of Floyd County government since May 1998.

More than any other Floyd County politician, Harris has offered campaign money to current Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson. The Pikeville attorney and coal operator gave Thompson maximum contributions of \$1,000 on three occasions — once in March of 1998, again in October of the same year and once in November of 2001.

But Thompson is not alone, not by a long shot.

Further records show that Harris also gave a maximum \$1,000 contribution to Floyd Sheriff John K. Blackburn and then-county commissioner hopeful Larry Roberts in 1998. Records indicate Harris gave \$500 to

Prestonsburg Mayor Jerry Fannin and another \$200 to current county magistrate Gerald Derossett the same year, bringing his total amount of 1998 Floyd County contributions to \$4,700.

It would be two years later, in February of 2000, before Harris would open his wallet for another Floyd County politician. On Feb. 1, he gave \$1,000 to Johnny Ray Turner's campaign for state senator. Turner is another, along with McConnell, who has now fallen under the examining eye of the U.S. Attorney's Office as part of that agency's investigation into Harris' contributions.

Next was Thompson's \$1,000 in 2001, and then in 2002, Harris chipped in a grand apiece to Floyd Jailer Roger Webb and attorney general favorite Greg Stumbo.

The grand total since 1998 now rests at \$8,700.

So what does all this mean? Maybe

This creates an important multiplier effect that has exposed some 10 million people to crucial wildlife conservation concepts.

Applications will be accepted until the day before each of the 2003 sessions remaining (July 16-23, July 25-August 1, August 3-10 and August 12-19), and educators can apply for next year,

First bird with West Nile reported in state

FRANKFORT — Kentucky's first bird with West Nile virus in 2003 has been reported.

A Cardinal found dead in Crittenden County on June 30

was tested and found to have the virus. This is the first positive case of more than 100 birds tested this year.

Two horses in Central Kentucky have been found to have the virus. No human cases have been reported in Kentucky. Last year, 693 birds from 101 counties tested positive for the virus.

The Department for Public Health advises that the risk of people and/or animals contracting West Nile is very small and offers the following facts about and tips for reducing the risk of contact with the virus.

- Stay indoors at dawn, dusk and in the early evening when mosquitoes are most active.

- Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants when you are outdoors.

- Spray clothing with repellents containing permethrin or DEET (N,N-diethyl-meta-toluamide) since mosquitoes may bite through thin clothing.

- Apply insect repellent sparingly to exposed skin. An effective repellent will contain 30 percent DEET for adults and 10 percent DEET for children.

- Whenever you use an insecticide or insect repellent, be sure to read and follow the

manufacturer's Directions for Use printed on the product. NOTE: Vitamin B and "ultra-sonic" devices are NOT effective in preventing mosquito bites.

Additionally, people can take the following steps to reduce mosquitoes around their home and neighborhoods by reducing the amount of standing water available for mosquito breeding:

- Remove all discarded tires on your property. Used tires are one of the primary breeding areas for mosquitoes.

- Dispose of tin cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots, or similar water-holding containers.

- Drill holes in the bottom of recycling containers left outdoors.

- Make sure roof gutters drain properly, and clean clogged gutters in the spring and fall. Roof gutters can produce millions of mosquitoes each season.

- Turn over plastic wading pools and wheelbarrows when not in use.

- Change water in bird-baths.

- Clean vegetation and debris from edges of ponds.

- Clean and chlorinate

swimming pools, outdoor saunas and hot tubs. Aerate or add fish to ornamental ponds. Remember to drain water from pool covers and tarps.

- Use landscaping to eliminate standing water that collects on your property.

- Mosquitoes may breed in any puddle that lasts for more than four days.

Most people who are exposed to the virus will not show symptoms. Even people living in at-risk areas are unlikely to get sick from exposure to the virus.

However, mild symptoms may include slight fever and/or headache, possibly with skin rash and swollen lymph glands. A rapid onset of high fever with head and body aches, neck stiffness, disorientation, stupor and muscle weakness marks more severe infections of encephalitis.

WNV can also infect other animals such as horses. The Kentucky Department of Agriculture's Division of Animal Health is responsible for directing and coordinating investigations to determine if a horse has become infected with WNV. When a horse shows signs of neurological disorder or an encephalitic disease is suspected, a veterinarian should be consulted. The local veterinarian should then notify the State Veterinarian, Dr. Don Notter, at (502) 564-3956.

A new website to help Kentuckians learn more about West Nile Virus is also available.

The site — www.westnile.ky.gov — provides information from various state agencies involved in preventing the spread of the disease and protecting people from mosquitoes.

Medicare and You

Q Does Medicare Part B cover eyeglasses?

A Medicare Part B will help pay for one pair of eyeglasses or contact lenses after each cataract surgery.

Q What do I need to know before purchasing my eyeglasses or contact lenses if I have Medicare?

A Some important tips are:

- You must have an order/prescription from your doctor for the eyeglasses or contact lenses.

- Medicare providers and supplies are required to submit Medicare Part B claims for you.

- Suppliers that are 'participating' with Medicare agree to accept assignment on all Medicare claims. This means they accept the Medicare approved amount as payment in full for covered services. Your out of pocket expense will be 20 percent of Medicare's approved amount for covered services, plus any unmet Part B deductible.

- Suppliers that are 'non-participating' with Medicare and don't accept assignment on your claim to Medicare can charge you up to their usual/customary

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

Police were kept busy over the July 4 holiday weekend, and none so much as the state's Kentucky Vehicle Enforcement in Pikeville.

Reports from KVE Post 10 in Pikeville say that from the time the 68-hour holiday detail began at 6 p.m. on July 3 until it ended at midnight on July 6, a total of 575 citations were issued.

Officials at the Pikeville post reported that 162 of the citations issued were for speeding, while 52 were seat belt violations. Four of the 575 citations were child restraint violations and 345 were issued for various other violations, such as no proof of insurance and reckless driving.

Officers made 34 arrests over the holiday weekend, with 12 of those arrests for travelers charged with driving under the influence.

Lt. Keith Belcher, deputy jailer in Pike County, said DUI arrests were up from last year in that community, and that jail population peaked at 200.

Belcher said the weekend's nice weather probably played a part in the jump, but also credited law enforcement agencies for putting in a lot of hours over the weekend.

Point is, there's nothing inherently wrong with supporting a candidate in any given election. Elections cost money, and anyone who wants can back anybody they chose. But why would a Pike County coal operator have nearly \$9,000 worth of concern about who sits on the Floyd County Fiscal Court, or in the sheriff's or jailer's offices, or the mayor of Prestonsburg's seat? Without even attempting to find out who might or might not have been an alleged "straw" for a Harris contribution, it's still kind of strange that a guy would give that much money to ensure the election of political leaders not even in his own county.

None of this means, of course, that Floyd County politicians should turn a cold shoulder to campaign funds, that is unless they also fail to find a wholeheartedly good reason why such an offer was made in the first place.

U.S. Attorney Gregory F. Van Tatenhove said he could not comment on the grand jury's work because such proceedings are secret.

However, the fact that witnesses have been asked about donations to candidates other than Hays could indicate a move to broaden the investigation to other campaigns. Harris has helped raise money in recent years for a number of local, state and federal candidates.

State campaign-finance records show that 23 people gave maximum \$1,000 contributions in their respective races, and of those, 20 also gave \$1,000 each to Johnny Ray Turner.

Most of the common contributors in the three races contacted by the Herald-Leader either declined to comment or said the federal grand jury asked them only about contributions to

Hays.

Those who would comment said the money they gave Hays was their own, not money supplied by Harris.

Four of the people who gave \$1,000 in each of those three races, including Harris, also gave \$1,000 to McConnell, state records show.

Chandler said he knew nothing about the grand jury's investigation or about whether Harris arranged improper contributions to his campaign.

"I have no knowledge of anything like that, and if anybody brings anything like that to our attention we will immediately return any contributions that would be tainted in any way by that sort of thing," said Chandler, the Democratic nominee for governor.

Chandler pointed out that he returned contributions from Harris and from Glenn Turner, a Floyd County resident who works for Harris, after the two were indicted in connection with the district judge's race in Pikeville.

The federal indictment against Harris also includes Glenn Turner; Hays, a former state senator; Hays' wife, Brenda, and six of his campaign workers.

Harris is also charged with taking \$36,000 from his bank account in a way that was calculated to evade federal rules. Banks must report withdrawals of \$10,000 or more; Harris made four \$9,000 withdrawals just before the election, the indictment said.

Hays is also charged with concealing an illegal \$20,000 contribution from Harris by putting some of the cash into a checking account, then immediately writing a check for the same amount to his campaign.

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



Boone joins brother as All-Star selections

CINCINNATI — Aaron Boone was 10 years old when he accompanied his father, Bob, to his fourth and final All-Star game at Comiskey Park in 1983. He remembers leaving the ballpark and making a promise,

"I told them I'd be back in 20 years," he said. "I'm not joking."

Boone's prediction came true Sunday morning when his father — now the Cincinnati Reds manager — called to him and wiggled his index finger, taking him aside to pass along some good news.

The third baseman had made his first All-Star game. He is indeed going back to Chicago, 20 years later.

"It's just one of those things that's very humbling," said Aaron, hitting .267 with 15 homers and 51 RBIs. "It's a huge honor."

"In our clubhouse, there were five or six guys who were on the bubble, including myself. Certainly, Jose (Guillen) was our MVP. You'd like to see him get rewarded, but it's awesome. It's something you look forward to, and it'll be nice to be there with Bret. What can you say?"

Aaron and Bret, a second baseman with Seattle, are the 14th set of brothers to become All-Stars. Bret, who is the older brother, made it for the first time with the Reds in 1998, and will join him in Chicago.

"It's special because he'll be there with his family," Aaron

said. "I never get to see him during the season. It'll be fun."

Boone was the Reds' MVP last season, when he hit .241 with 26 homers and 87 RBIs. There was no clear-cut choice for an All-Star on the roster this season.

"I'm very proud of him," Bob Boone said. "It was a tough call. A lot of our guys could've gotten in. You wish we could have done better so we could send multiple guys one time."

The Reds have had one representative each of the last three years.

Ken Griffey Jr. has been sidelined by a dislocated shoulder and other ailments. Austin Kearns was in line to be an All-

Star before he bruised his shoulder on May 21, causing him to struggle.

Guillen has been the Reds' most productive player, batting .350 with 17 homers and 44 RBIs as their fourth outfielder.

"I'm not disappointed," Guillen said about missing out on the All-Star game. "What happens, happens. I'm happy for Aaron. He plays every day, and he plays hard. I get to go home and see my kids."

"There's nothing you can do. I have no control over it. All I can do is come in and prepare myself to play and put up numbers."

■ GRIFFEY OUT AGAIN: Griffey was out of the lineup for

the entire series with the Mets. He was dizzy on Saturday, the result of dehydration, and was still feeling bad before the final game.

"Hitting was fine," Griffey said Sunday. "When I started moving, I got quite a bit dizzy. I figured it would go away, but it never went away."

Griffey, in the fourth year of a \$116.5 million, nine-year contract, has missed 47 starts

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

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


over Monday praised a just-completed summer practice period, saying West Virginia's athletes now are on an even playing field with teams from

neighboring states.

Harris outruns Late Model field

Blackburn grabs pole, finishes third in feature

COEBURN, Va. — Lonesome Pine International Raceway had its share of Fourth of July fireworks both on and above the track Friday night as Chad Harris claimed a victory in the 100-lap Late Model Stock feature portion of the U.S. Army 265 racing program.

Harris, who makes the five-hour tow each week from Stuarts Draft, fought off the early challenges from Steve Blackburn to beat one of the strongest fields of the season at the .375-mile NASCAR Dodge Weekly Series oval.

The special Friday holiday race marked the first appearance this season at LPIR by 2002 track NASCAR Atlantic Region champion Wade Day. He qualified 10th quickest and was able to fight his way to fifth in the running order by lap 42 before finishing sixth.

Harris took the checkered flag ahead of Matt Wolfe, Prestonsburg driver Steve Blackburn, Eric McClure and Michael Kidd in the second through fifth finishing positions. Blackburn provided the biggest surprise of the night when he snatched the pole with the top lap in time trials.

Blackburn jumped to the early lead and held it for the first 10 laps. Throughout the first 16 laps, he and Harris raced side by side for the lead. Blackburn and Harris were still dueling for first place when lapped cars appeared ahead of them. As the two were vying for position on lap 15 at the exit of the second turn, the lapped car of Steve Treadway was thrown into the mix to create a three-wide situation that Harris used to get the lead.

Blackburn eventually slipped to third behind Wolfe after keeping the large crowd standing through the early laps.

Wolfe, who was coming off a lackluster race the previous weekend, came back with some-

thing to prove. Wolfe qualified second quickest to start alongside Blackburn, but he had fallen back to third by the fourth laps. By lap 20, he was challenging Blackburn for second. Wolfe made several attempts to get under Blackburn, even running side by side with him for a number of laps, before eventually taking the second position on lap 35 and remaining there for the rest of the night.

Kidd and McClure were racing each other for the fourth position throughout the race. Kidd and McClure slid up the track in turns three and four of the second lap, opening the door for Kres VanDyke to slip through and take fourth place. VanDyke remained in fourth position until lap 20 when McClure advanced past him, bumping him to fifth.

McClure began battling Blackburn for third, but McClure triggered a caution flag on lap 42 when he spun trying to race hard for spot.

Day was lurking in fifth place behind the leaders for the restart. On lap 43, the yellow flag was thrown again as a result of debris on the track. When the green flag was dropped, Kidd and Day kept the crowd on its feet by running side by side for several laps. Day's car broke loose on the backstretch of lap 55, but he was able to hold his position.

Sparks began to show under VanDyke's car on lap 58 and the yellow flag appeared two laps later as his car began smoking. VanDyke parked his car and attributed the problem to a failed clutch.

When green-flag racing resumed, the remaining 40 laps were full of beating and banging all the way to the finish.

On lap 87, Day, Kidd and McClure raced three-wide for position. As Day faded to sixth, McClure challenged Kidd again on lap 93 before taking the fourth position on lap 94.

Action resumes at LPIR Saturday at 7 p.m. with a full slate of races.




The league was started by people who moved to Bowling Green after growing up playing hockey. There was no ice rink here, so the roller hockey was an alternative, Kimbro said.

Having the NHL's Nashville Predators about an hour away has also helped the popularity of the sport in this region. Members of the Predators visit the WCIFL rink at Basil Griffin Park each spring.

The close proximity allows the kids a chance to see professional hockey in person.

"It's just like everything, if you watch it on TV, it's totally different," Boling said.

Ornelas watches hockey every once in a while, when he's not doing homework. He's been to a few Predators games, too. During the offseason, Ornelas' hockey gear doesn't stay in a closet. He plays on a traveling team.

"Sometimes you just come out to the rink and play around," Ornelas said.

The league is hoping for a new rink and maybe a small hockey complex to keep growing.

"We feel like that is going to be necessary for us to grow to 200, 250 or 300 kids," Boling said.

The winner also gave a lot of the credit to series points leader Matt Kenseth, another Roush entry, who ran second and kept Labonte behind him until Kenseth had to pit for a splash of gas at the end of lap 156. — The Associated Press

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

Kentucky's unemployment rate declines in May

FRANKFORT - Kentucky's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate of 5.7 percent for May was lower than the 5.8 percent recorded for April, according to the Department for Employment Services, a Cabinet for Workforce Development agency. In May 2002, the state's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate also was 5.7 percent.

The U.S. seasonally adjusted jobless rate in May increased to 6.1 percent from 6 percent in April.

"Kentucky's unemployment rate has either been 5.7 percent or 5.8 percent each of the past four months," said Carlos Cracraft, the department's chief labor market analyst. "May marked the 14th

consecutive month that Kentucky's unemployment rate has been lower than the U.S. unemployment rate."

Six of the 10 major nonfarm job North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) sectors had employment decreases in May, while three recorded increases and one remained the same, Cracraft said.

According to the seasonally adjusted employment data, the construction sector lost 1,100 jobs from April to May, marking the fourth consecutive month that the sector has shrunk. Since May 2002, the sector has fallen by 1,400 jobs.

The financial activities sector had 1,000 fewer employees in

May than in April, but this sector has added 600 jobs since May 2002. This sector includes establishments involved in finance, insurance, real estate and property leasing or rental.

In the trade, transportation and utilities sector, employment decreased by 800 in May. This sector includes retail and wholesale trade, transportation and utilities businesses, and warehousing, and is the largest sector in Kentucky with 365,900 employees. Since May 2002, the sector has lost 6,900 jobs.

In May, the manufacturing sector had 800 fewer employees than in April, and 7,500 fewer since May 2002. "The May manufacturing employment level of 268,900 is the lowest this sector has been since October 1991 when it was 267,900," said Cracraft.

The education and health services sector fell by 700 jobs in

May. However, the sector has added 6,400 jobs since May 2002.

The leisure and hospitality sector recorded a decline in employment for the fourth straight month in May, losing 400 jobs from April to May. The sector has decreased by 900 employees since May 2002.

The information sector had 31,900 employees in April and May. This sector, which includes firms involved in publishing, Internet activities and broadcasting and news syndication, had 400 more employees in May 2003 than in May 2002.

On the positive side, the professional and business services sector added 1,600 jobs in May. Compared to May 2002, the sector had 400 more employees in May 2003. "May marked two straight months that this sector has recorded an employment gain," said Cracraft.

The other services sector, which includes such establishments as repair and maintenance places, personal and laundry services, religious organizations, and civic and professional organizations, rose by 1,000 jobs in May. Over the past 12 months, the sector has lost 1,800 jobs.

The government sector, which includes public education, added 400 jobs in May. This sector had 800 fewer employees in May 2002 than May 2003.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor

Statistics monthly estimate of the number of employed Kentuckians for May 2003 was 1,871,841 on a seasonally adjusted basis. This figure is down 7,428 from the 1,879,269 employed in April 2003, but up 14,480 from the 1,857,361 employed in May 2002.

The monthly estimate of the number of unemployed Kentuckians for May 2003 was 112,337. This figure is down 2,952 from the 115,289 unemployed in April 2003, and down 408 from the 112,745 Kentuckians unemployed in May 2002.

The monthly estimate of the number of Kentuckians in the civilian labor force for May 2003 was 1,984,178. This figure is down 10,380 from the 1,994,558 recorded in April 2003, but up 14,072 from the 1,970,106 recorded for May 2002.

The civilian labor force

includes non-military workers and unemployed Kentuckians who are actively seeking work. It does not include unemployed Kentuckians who have not looked for employment within the past four weeks.

Employment and unemployment statistics are based on estimates. They are compiled to indicate employment trends rather than actually to count numbers of people who are or are not working.

NOTE: Kentucky's statewide unemployment rate and employment levels are seasonally adjusted. Employment statistics undergo sharp fluctuations due to seasonal events, such as weather changes, harvests, holidays and school openings and closings. Seasonal adjustments eliminate these influences and make it easier to observe statistical trends.

FRANKFORT - Kentucky Revenue Secretary Dana Mayton has announced that the 2003 State Real Property Tax Rate is 13.3 cents per each \$100 of assessed value. KRS 132.020 requires the Revenue Cabinet to set the real property rate no later than July 1 of each year. According to Secretary Mayton, "The estimated total real property

assessment for the 2003 tax year is approximately \$160 billion, up from \$151 billion in 2002. The rate for 2002 was 13.5 cents per each \$100 of assessed value."

Property taxes, once the primary source of state and local government revenue, now account for only about 6 percent of the state's annual General Fund revenues.

Doggie table manners

Did you teach your children table manners? Sure you did. Chances are that at dinner last night they more or less ate with utensils, may have even said "please" once or twice, and didn't fling globs of mashed potatoes at their little brother (at least while you were looking).

So how are the dog's table manners? Of course he should have them, too! It is much better to teach good manners right from the start than to correct bad ones later. In fact, let me caution you right now: a dog that is already very protective over his food is not something you want to deal with on your own. It is potentially a very dangerous situation, and should be approached only with one-on-one professional advice tailored to the individual circumstance.

So how do you become the Emily Post of canine table etiquette? Here are a few simple rules your dog should know, and how to teach them. Remember, I am talking about a young pup or newly acquired dog who is not food-aggressive, just lacking proper manners.

RULE 1: I MUST NOT BITE THE HAND THAT FEEDS ME.

Several times a week, instead of just plunking the dish down, sit down with the pup and feed his meal a little at a time from your hand. Vary this by sometimes putting a small portion in the dish, but leave your hand in the dish also. Once the pup seems unperturbed by this, you can reach into the bowl and stir around in the food with your fingers.

Praise and pet the pup while doing this to show him you approve of his calm acceptance of your hand in his dish. The hand is not a threat; in fact, it usually contains even more goodies. If he should accidentally nip you, give a high-pitched yelp like another puppy would, to startle him, then say something to the effect of "Ow!"



On June 20, 1906, Mary Matney was appointed as the very first postmaster for the brand-new community of Muddy Branch, Kentucky. But nearly five years later, on January 16, 1911, the Muddy Branch Post Office ceased

to exist and Thealka, Kentucky was born. Matney continued serving as postmaster at Thealka until June 1914.

My memories as a kid growing up in that particular community and of that particular institution are limited to pretty much only one postmaster, Alta Lee Preston. But even though she held the job longer than anyone else ever did (33 years), counting Matney, more than a dozen people were postmaster at Thealka before she was.

Back in 1987, long-time Northeast Coal Company employee, Theodore Miller, gave me a list of all the people who had served in that capacity. That list indicates that James N. Meek followed Matney and passed out the mail until 1922. He was followed by Flem Griffith, who sorted the cards and letters for the families of the

Kentucky State Police officers continue to investigate the apparent drowning of a Pike County woman at Jenny Wiley State Park's Dewey Lake Saturday. According to a report issued Sunday by the Pikeville Post of the Kentucky State Police, 31-year-old Tammy Tackett Akers, of Virgie, and a companion were floating on rafts near the shore of the lake Saturday at around 6 p.m., when Akers apparently got off her raft and drowned. Her companion was asleep on another raft and did not know that Akers had drowned until other guests of the park found her body in shallow water, the report said...Prosecutors agreed Tuesday to separate the trials of two Floyd Countians charged with murder stemming from the May 1992, beating death of an elderly Turkey Creek man, Brenda Smith, 22, and Michael Watkins, 23, of Glo Hollow, were to be tried together Monday in connection with the death of Smith's husband, 72-year-old Simson Smith. After hearing two days of testimony, a jury deliberated about 90 minutes before finding Brenda Smith, guilty of first degree manslaughter in the beating death of Simson Smith, last May. The jury deliberated just nine minutes before recommending a 20-year prison term...Although the Prestonsburg City Council continues efforts to fund and construct a long-awaited recycling center to help cut costs and clean up the environment, the project may take longer than originally anticipated. When the council approved its operating budget of the 1993-1994 fiscal year at its June 28 meeting, it also voted to earmark five percent, or roughly \$19,200 of the sanitation budget to help meet the costs for the proposed recycling center...Floyd Circuit Court records show that a Drift man who allegedly killed one person Monday and shot another in the face, was convicted nearly 20 years before in connection with a 1974 murder. According to officers of the Pikeville Post of the Kentucky State Police, Herbert Gene Salisbury Jr., 45, had allegedly engaged in an argument Monday with Meredith Allen Conn, 29, of Printer; Jimmy Hall, 29, of Drift; and Michael Bryant, 20, also of Drift. Officers said that following the argument, Salisbury walked into Hall's residence and shot Conn numerous times with a handgun, wounded Hall and fired twice at Bryant. Conn was pronounced dead at the scene by Floyd County Coroner Roger E. Nelson. Hall was transferred to the University of Kentucky Medical Center at Lexington, where he remains in stable but serious condition with wounds to the chin and shoulder. Bryant was uninjured...A state Revenue Cabinet official said Tuesday he expects no repeat of the circumstances that led to the ouster last week of Johnson County's Property Valuation Administrator in any of

the other 24 counties under a Revenue Cabinet watch. Jim Coffman, Property Taxation Commissioner for the State Revenue Cabinet said that the removal last week of Johnson County PVA Custer Picklesimer stemmed from a "significant lack of cooperation" from Picklesimer on a requirement that property values be reassessed...A Floyd County man pleaded guilty in the U.S. District Court at Pikeville Monday to four charges that he had extorted money in his capacity as a state Revenue-Cabinet officer. David Smith, 28, of Ivel, admitted Monday that he had accepted \$500 from a Knott County grocer in return for promising to "fix" an audit; and admitted receiving a check from grocer Edward Williams through the mail, constituting mail fraud. Sentencing for Smith is scheduled for October 12...Although a Floyd Circuit Court jury did not reach a guilty verdict after nearly two hours of deliberation Wednesday in the case of a Hueysville man who allegedly raped a 15-year-old girl, the accused left the courtroom in chains. Floyd Circuit Judge John David Caudill declared a mistrial in the case Wednesday after a jury foreman announced that the panel had decided it could not reach a fair decision because the accused, Cisco Neeley, and his 18-year-old step-son, Chris "Baby John" Shepherd, had allegedly made lewd comments to female jurors during recess...Floyd School Board member Hattie Owens refused to participate in a questionable secret session of the school board Wednesday which was called to discuss personnel. Floyd Superintendent Steve Towler asked that the board go into closed session for discussions which would lead to the "appointment" of personnel at Wednesday's special called board meeting...Again citing a lack of budget information and a projected shortfall in state funds, Floyd County School Board members Wednesday postponed a decision on employee salary increases and appeared unwilling to consider imposing a three percent utility tax to boost revenue. At Wednesday's special meeting, board members were presented with an unbalanced budget and were told it would cost about \$220,000 for every one percent increase in salary for all employees in the district...McDowell's boys head basketball coach Johnny Ray Turner resigned his position with the Floyd County school system and accepted the head coach's job at Johnson Central High School Thursday, after meeting with Johnson County Superintendent Frank Hamilton. Turner will leave McDowell after coaching the school in its last year of operation. RULE 2: BOWLS THAT GO AWAY COME BACK WITH EVEN MORE STUFF IN THEM.

Once again, feed only part of

the meal; when Pup has finished that, take the bowl away and add some more to it. Occasionally add something he likes even more, like a few bites of cooked chicken. The idea to convey is that it's a Good Thing when my person picks up my bowl.

RULE 3: MY PERSON IS ALLOWED TO HANDLE MY MOUTH.

As part of everyday grooming and handling sessions, practice opening the pup's mouth, looking at his teeth and tongue, and touch-

ing his teeth and gums. Praise and reward him when he allows just a few seconds without a fuss; gradually extend the time. Also teach the "out" or "give" command.

Start with a toy the pup likes but is not highly possessive of; have some small treats handy. Reach the pup the toy and say, "take it". Praise him as he takes it in his mouth. After a few seconds say, "out" or "give it".

At the same time help the pup open his mouth by placing one hand over his muzzle and inserting your thumb just behind his upper canine tooth. Take the toy, give him a really tasty treat, and praise him—that was hard for him! Give another "take it" command and give back his toy. He gets to keep his prize (or a reasonable facsimile, the treat), but with your permission.

The individual dog will dictate how far you can go with this exercise, but try to avoid asking for really prized possessions until he is very reliable. Here's an illustration of the practical value of this exercise: My Doberman happily gives up his rawhide bone on request. When he grabbed a flavored medication that I dropped while trying to give it to one of the other dogs, I was able to reach in his mouth and retrieve it—not an advisable move had he not been trained to release on command!

his dinner. This doesn't have to be a sit-stay for any length of time, especially at first; just a "Put your butt on the floor for a second to show me you're aware that I'm in control of food distribution." (You are also in control of door opening, leash attaching, petting sessions, etc. and it doesn't do the dog a bit more harm than it does the kids to ask you nicely for something they want.)

RULE 5: MY PEOPLE ARE ENTITLED TO EAT IN PEACE.

Begging at the table is not allowed. The pup goes in another room while the family eats, or he holds a down-stay across the room when he is old enough and able to do so. No one is allowed to be suckered by crying or pleading brown eyes.

If he is allowed any table food at all, it is served to him at the end of the family's meal, and served in his own dish. One slipped tidbit under the table rewards him and starts him on his way to

becoming a professional beggar.

RULE 6: I AM ENTITLED TO EAT IN PEACE.

This means that even when practicing the above exercises, the dog is not teased or stressed out about whether or not he's going to get his supper. The point of the exercises is that human activity around the food dish is not something bad.

This also means that the kids are absolutely NEVER allowed to harass the dog while he eats, or tease him with food, even if he's very tolerant.

Good luck. You're on your own with the kids!

Preston of the Yukon and his dog, King, that I'd ordered off the radio."


